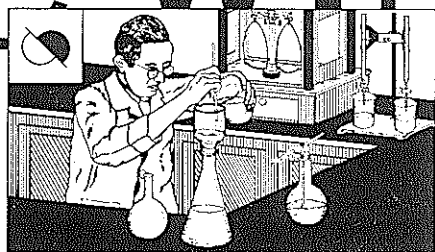

EMPLOYEES SET IN-PLANT BLOOD DONATION RECORD

Bob Everman, Son Of GAT Employee, Wins \$3,000 Scholarship

Clyde (Bob) Everman, son of GAT employee, C. T. Everman, has been awarded a \$3,000 business scholarship to the University of Cincinnati.

The scholarship is made available by the Williams Manufacturing Company of Portsmouth in memory of its late board chairman, A. Graves Williams.

Everman, who is a senior at Greenup, Kentucky, is the first man from Kentucky to receive the award since the program was started in 1949.

Larry Pratt, of Portsmouth High School, is the co-winner of the award. The two scholarships are made available annually.

Father Is Instrument Mechanic

Clyde's father is an instrument mechanic with Goodyear Atomic Corporation.

The winners were chosen on the basis of their interviews with members of Williams management plus results of company and university examinations and their social activities in and out of school.

Fourteen hundred dollars of each scholarship is used to pay the winning students' first-year expenses at U. C.

In the second, third, fourth and fifth years the student "co-ops" with the company by working in the plant during his non-school working weeks.

The money earned during these work periods, plus \$400 scholarship aid each year, helps to pay the educational costs.

Three general boards have been erected in the training building, one in the 720 building, one in warehouse nine, and one in Goodyear's personnel building.

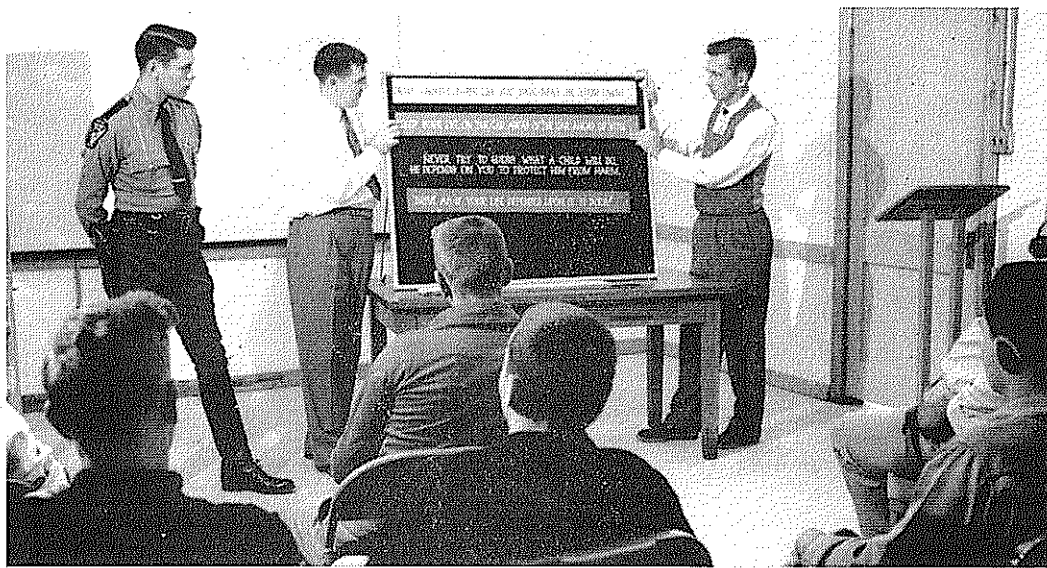
A 4 foot by 4 foot bulletin board also has been erected outside the library for library use.

'Better Drivers' Is Aim Of GAT Driver-Safety Training Program

The death rate on our highways is alarming and the Goodyear Atomic Corporation is trying to help remedy the situation through a course in driver safety.

The safety course is a part of the training program conducted by Goodyear Atomic Corporation at plantsite. It is aimed at producing better drivers.

The two-hour course points out bad driving manners, and shows how they can be corrected. It illustrates proper driving habits and attitudes, and emphasizes concentration on the job at hand—"Driving".

Ed Ellis and Bob Stone, who conduct the class, point out that accidents on the highways take a greater toll of life, limb, and property than

did all the wars in which this country has fought.

The training instructors use cartoons, movies and flannel boards to emphasize bad risks, traffic violations, the mental make-up of a top notch driver, etc.

The bad risks are those drivers who are "Egotists", "Show-Offs",

Blue Cross, Shield Membership Plans To Be Open April 29-30

Membership in Blue Cross and Blue Shield will be open two days this month for employees of Goodyear Atomic Corporation.

Once each year a re-enrollment period is arranged during which anyone who isn't already signed up in the two plans may join.

Also at this time anyone desiring to make a change from single to family contract may do so.

Single contracts for Blue Cross and Blue Shield are \$2.70 per month. The family contracts for the two are \$6.50 per month.

The re-enrollment period has been set for April 29, and 30, in Room C-1 of the training building.

It should be noted that those who do not enroll during the initial enrollment or within 30 days after they are hired are not eligible to join except at the Annual Re-enrollment.

Observe National Hospital Day May 2; GAT To Have General Exhibits On Hand

Goodyear Atomic Corporation will participate in the observance of National Hospital Day, May 2, 1954 by having a display at the Chillicothe Veterans Hospital.

GAT will have a panel display which will show the uses of radioactive isotopes in various industries—iron, drilling, firebrick, etc.

The laboratory division of Goodyear Atomic has prepared an exhibit which shows the varying intensity of radio-active material as an object gets closer and closer to it. This is done with geiger counter and an oscillograph.

The exhibit at the hospital, located north of Chillicothe on Route 35, will be shown to school children on April 29 and 30 and to special groups on May 1.

The exhibit will be open to the general public on Sunday, May 2.

149 Pints Collected Smashes GAT's First Record Of 113 Pints

Employees of Goodyear Atomic Corporation set a new in-plant blood donation record for a single day Friday, April 2nd, when one-hundred forty nine persons donated.

Two-hundred fifteen persons signed up but the community relations department was able to schedule only a part of these since the blood-mobile could be available for only one day. The record-breaking donation shattered the old one day mark set by Peter Kiewit Sons' Co. when they donated 122 pints on December 29, 1953.

Old Record Broken

The new record set by Goodyear also eclipsed GAT's old mark of 113 pints which were donated on October 26, 1953, the first time GAT employees donated blood.

The blood donation was made to the Regional Blood Bank of Huntington under the auspices of Pike County Chapter of the American Red Cross.

B. F. Brown Company, caterer, supplied the coffee and paper cups to the Pike County Red Cross Chapter.

PRINCELLA WARNER SPENDS SPARE TIME ON HOBBY: CROCHETING BEAD PURSES

Princella Warner never has to buy a purse. She makes her own.

That is the hobby of the typist in the orientation office at the training school. Princella doesn't make ordinary-type leather or cloth purses. Her's are the beaded type.

The beads are purchased already strung on nylon thread. She combines the nylon threaded bead strand with the crochet yarn to make the beaded purses. She crochets them into various patterns.

Princella, who commutes from Ironton, to plantsite, has been making her own purses for the last five years. In that time she has made six and is currently working on her seventh purse.

"Some of them," she said, "take longer to make than others. It de-

pends on the size and style." So far, Princella has made a jet black, a bright red, a gun metal, a brown, a red iris, and a brown iris purse.

After she has selected the purse frame—either silver, embossed gold or shell type—she starts putting her crocheting experience to work. That work may consist of working with either round or the cut type beads. Most of her purses are made of the cut type beads. She has but one purse made of the round type beads.

She says that she usually follows the written directions but sometimes doesn't like the pattern and substitutes her own. The purse hobbyist emphasized that she doesn't make them to sell because they cost too much and consume too much time to make.
