

GAT Blood Supply Is Assured: 280 Pints **Donated At Last Visit**

Employees of GAT donated 280 pints of blood when the staff of the Huntington Regional Blood Center visited the plantsite last month. The visit was conducted under the auspices of the Pike County Chapter, American Red Cross, The donation was the first to be made by GAT employees under the ARC Blood Bank Program for corporations or registered groups of individuals.

Goodyear Atomic Corporation, under the new program, will receive credits equal to 70 percent of the total donations with the remaining 30 percent being held by the American Red Cross for its nationwide program. The newly organized Blood Bank will assure all of GAT's family that an adequate supply of blood will be available for the employee and his immediate family should the need occur.

Need Proper Care In Handling: Need Correct Signature

GAT employees are now being paid with pre-numbered checks printed on an IBM card. The new procedure has been adopted to speed up the preparation, processing, and recapitulation of the payroll by both the company and the bank.

In order to accomplish these purposes, there are certain instructions relating to your handling of the check which must be followed.

Do Not Mutilate

The check should not be mutilated in any way. The check should be tolded only on the indicated "fold" lines. When properly folded the check will fit into any wallet. Improper folding or exposure of the check to excessive dampness or heat causes major problems in processing the checks through the accounting machines.

Here are just a few of the problems encountered in relation to checks. Some checks are cashed without endorsement by the employee, others have the endorsement printed rather than written and still others are signed by another individual, such as a wife signing her husband's

Suggestions

The finance division offers the following items to employees as suggestions in depositing or the cashing of the payroll checks:

First: If you are sending the check to the bank for deposit to your account, it should be endorsed:

> "For deposit only" (employee's name)

Endorse the check, in a written signature, exactly as it is drawn on the face of the check.

Second: If you are cashing the check at a bank, grocery store, etc., don't endorse it until you are about to receive the cash. You should never endorse your check in blank. If the endorsed check is lost, the finder would be able to cash it.

Third: If you want to endorse the check to your wife, husband, or someone else, endorse it:

> "Pay to the Order of" (person's name) (employee's name)

Even then the person to whom the check is made payable should not endorse it until such time as that person is in the bank, the grocery store, etc., and about to cash it.

Now Decontrolled Program Housing

The Housing Section has been informed that the Title IX housing projects located in Portsmouth, Jackson and Chillicothe were decontrolled on January 26, 1955.

The programmed housing located in Waverly was decontrolled as of December 6, 1954.

Certificates of eligibility are no longer required and will not be issued either for rental or purchase of houses in the programmed housing projects.

The Federal Housing Administration has taken steps to protect the present occupants of rental housing by stating in its letters to the project owners that "in no event may able to all job applicants.

an eligible defense worker occupying a rental unit be required to vacate in order that such unit may be sold." The protection offered the present occupants in the above statement will be in force for the remainder of the two-year holding period that began with the FHA final inspection date. The final inspection date being that date upon which each house was officially declared ready for occupancy.

The housing section will continue to offer help to employees who request assistance in locating satisfactory housing. A list covering all of the programmed units is avail-


Employees and friends are invited to join these clubs.
