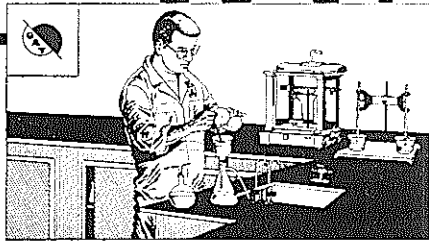

SECOND ANNUAL PICNIC JUNE 25 AT CAMDEN PARK

Mobile Blood Unit At GAT July 12, 13; Sign Pledge Card

The fifth visit of the Red Cross Bloodmobile at Goodyear Atomic Corporation will be made July 12, and 13.

The two day visit will be held in "D" wing of the training building and worked on the same basis as the four previous visits.

This visit will be the second under GAT's bloodbank program.

The program is intended to assure to each GAT employee and his family that whole blood is available as needed. To maintain membership in the plan, GAT employees must donate pints of blood equal to 10% of total number of employees. There are two visits a year.

Credited With 70%

The Huntington Regional Blood Center retains 30% of the total donation for disaster and military use and the remaining 70% is credited to GAT's blood bank, from which employees can draw blood as needed.

Many employees already have made use of the program for themselves or members of their families.

A recent example of the program in action occurred when a relative of a GAT employee needed blood. The relative was in a Columbus hospital. The emergency arose on a weekend.

Helicopter Used

Calls were made by the employee to a GAT representative, who called Huntington, to request the needed blood. The blood was flown

Fuller, McClelland Tell Training Story

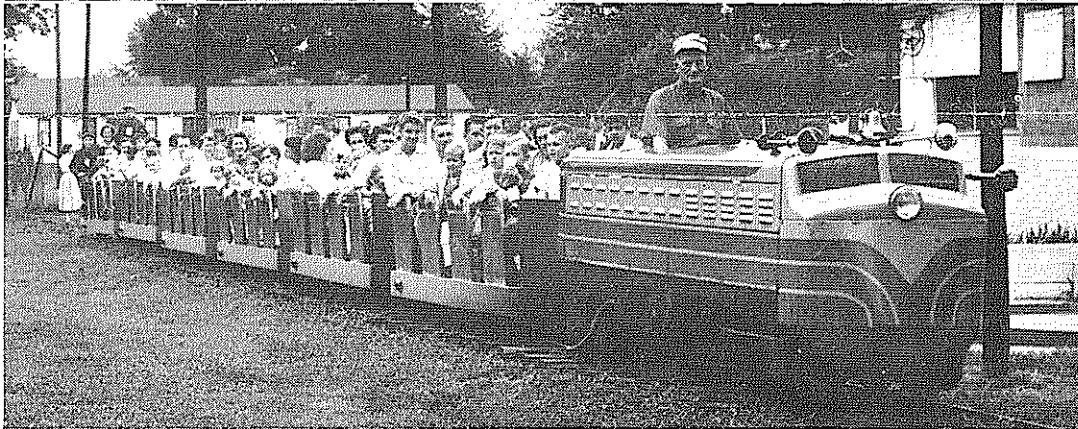
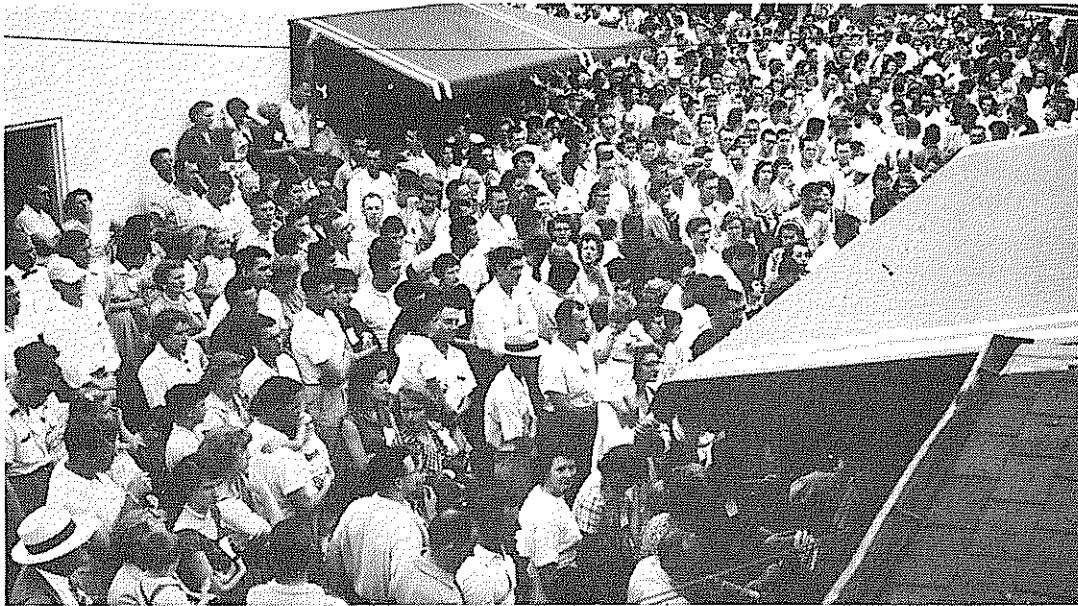
The story of Goodyear Atomic Corporation's training program will be told this month at the annual conference of the American Society of Training Directors.

The annual conference is being held in Los Angeles, California, today, tomorrow and Friday.

Fuller and McClelland will present a case study of the planning and administration of GAT's training program. They are the only two Ohioans on the program.

More than 600 training directors are expected to attend the conference.

FORMAL PLAN FOR RECOGNIZING SAFETY ACHIEVEMENTS AT GAT NOW IN EFFECT; DISABLING INJURIES ARE CLASSIFIED

The Goodyear Atomic Corporation now has a formal plan for recognizing outstanding safety achievements. The safety department, in making the announcement, said the awards will be made for extended periods of work without a disabling injury in accordance with the following plan:

If GAT works over 1,500,000 but less than 3,000,000 manhours without a disabling injury, every employee who was on the payroll at the time the accident-free period was broken and who is still on the payroll when the award selection cards are distributed, will be eligible for an award item valued at approximately \$2.

\$5 Award

If the employees work between 3,000,000 and 5,000,000 manhours without a disabling injury the award

item will be valued at approximately \$5.

\$10 Award

If 5,000,000 manhours without a disabling injury is exceeded each eligible employee will receive a safety award valued at approximately \$10.

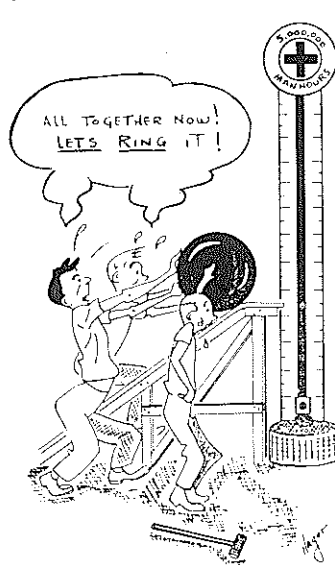
Since the value of the award item is determined by the length of the accident-free period, the award cannot be declared until the period is broken or 5,000,000 manhours have been exceeded. The awards will be selected by a committee composed of representatives from each division.

Three Categories

Injuries that are classified as "disabling" fall within one of three categories:

1. Any occupational injury or disease that causes an employee to lose one complete shift or

Park Reserved From 10 a.m.-5 p.m.; Rides, Pop, Ice Cream Free

Goodyear Atomic Corporation will take over Camden Amusement Park June 25, for its big "family" picnic.

The huge outing will last all day. GAT has leased the park from 10 a. m. to 5 p. m. The rides are free from noon to 5 p. m. and there are 12 grand prizes to be awarded employees.

This is the Second Annual Picnic and it is anticipated that attendance will be even larger than last year. An estimated 5,000 persons—employees and their families—attended the outing held last August.

Meet Fellow Employees

The Annual Picnic — like the Christmas Party—affords a fine opportunity for employees to meet the families of the employees with whom they work.

Camden Park, located just west of Huntington, West Virginia, will again be the picnic site. The park was chosen originally after an exhaustive search was made of the area for picnic facilities for a group numbering upwards of 5,000.

Residents living in Chillicothe have a choice of routes to the park. One is by Route 23 to Portsmouth, then east on Route 52 to Coal Grove. Cross the bridge at Coal Grove to Ashland, Kentucky, and then take route 60 east out of Ashland directly to the park. Other routes Chillicotheans can use is by way of U. S. 35 to Jackson and then Route 75 from Jackson, via Oak Hill, to Ironton. Take Route 52 east out of Ironton and go as described above, or cross toll bridge at Portsmouth and go east on Route 23.

Employees living in Waverly, Jackson, Oak Hill, Piketon, and Portsmouth will take one of the routes as already outlined.

Seen From Highway

Camden Park, with its many amusements, can be seen quite easily from the highway. Among the various rides that can be seen from the road are the ferris wheel, the roller coaster and the merry-go-round.

These are only a few of the amusements that will be available free of charge to all who want to enjoy them. Others include the train, kiddy-hand-cars, laff-in-the-dark, and miniature golf.

Goodyear Atomic personnel who are Air Force reservists—both officers and enlisted men—may participate in special training courses provided they can qualify.

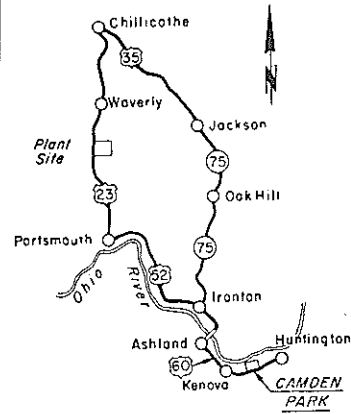
The men will be paid and must attend the meetings in uniform. The course will be taught at the Naval Training Center, Portsmouth.

Nearly 20 Percent Of GAT Employees Have Degrees; 190 Schools Represented

Nearly 20 percent of Goodyear Atomic employees are college graduates.

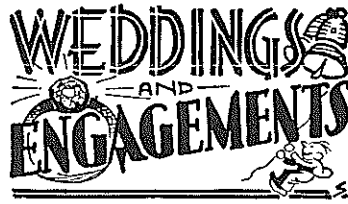
This is what a recent survey of GAT employees revealed. The survey was conducted by technical recruitment. According to the survey, there are 528 graduates on the payroll. Two hundred sixty-six are scientific and engineering degrees. Thirty-five additional employees have Masters degrees and twelve others have a Doctors degree.

A break-down shows that 190 colleges are represented and that the schools represented are located in 44 of the 48 states.

Of the 190 colleges, 83 have two or more graduates and the remaining schools have one representative each on the payroll.

Thirty of the 69 colleges and universities of Ohio are represented. In number of graduates, Ohio leads with 175 out of the 528 for a total of 33.1%.

This survey does not include the number of employees who have attended a college or university but who have not completed a four-year course.

more from work.

2. Any occupational injury or disease that causes permanent impairment of a physical function regardless of whether or not any time is actually lost from work.

3. Any occupational injury that results in dismemberment involving bone damage, regardless of whether or not any time is actually lost from work.

Outdoor Sign

In order to keep GAT employees informed of the status of our man-hour record, an outdoor signboard will be erected near the entrance to the main parking lot, opposite the X-100 building. A barometer-type indicator, approximately 20 feet in height, simulating the "high-striker" common at many carnivals, will be attached as a permanent part of the sign.

Safety Theme

The theme will be "Accident Prevention Rings the Bell" at GAT. Until the permanent sign is ready, temporary signs will be posted at conspicuous locations throughout the plant to provide a current record of our manhour achievement.

In establishing this plan it is recognized that items of merchandise can in no way compare with the rewards in the form of health and happiness that result from accident-free operations. It takes teamwork and conscious effort to achieve extended accident-free work periods and it requires the cooperation of every member of the GAT team.

GAT exceeded three million man-hours once, so there is no reason why that figure, and even a higher one, can't be obtained.

You never can tell when you or your family may need blood.

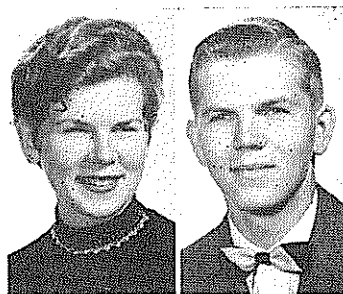

There are many sons and daughters of Goodyear Atomic employees who are saying goodbye to their high school alma maters.

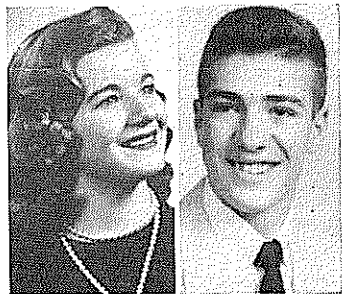
A survey of the students shown below indicates that some will continue their formal education while others plan on working. Some of the young men will enter military service. A few of the students will marry soon after graduation.

Ronald received his diploma from Glenwood High School, New Boston. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul F. Yinger. The father is in Department 425.

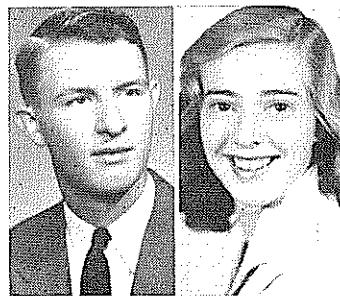
Boughton, Duncan Are Elected AIEE Officers

The officers were nominated and elected at a joint meeting of the Ohio Society of Professional Engineers and the AIEE.

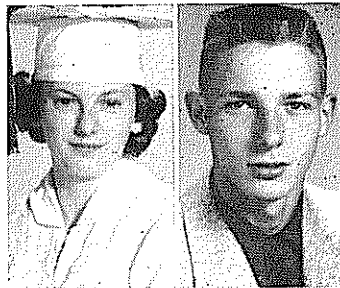

Dale is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Virgil C. Grooms. He was graduated from Peebles High School. The boy's father is employed in Department 743.

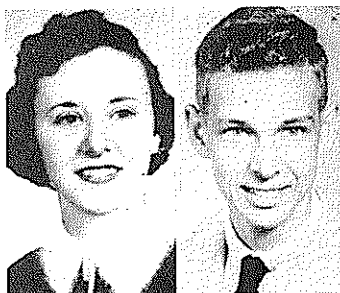
Kay, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Arnold, also is a graduate of Peebles High School and her father also is employed in Department 743.

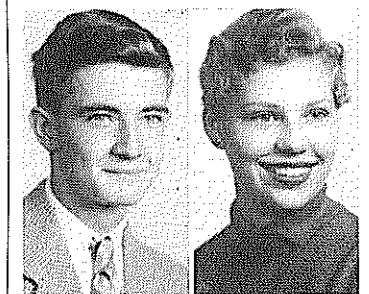

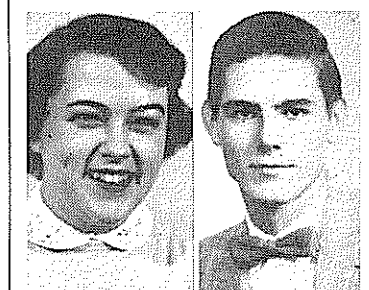

The drive was conducted on the basis of a "roundup". The membership teams were called ranchers with foremen and cowhands doing the soliciting.

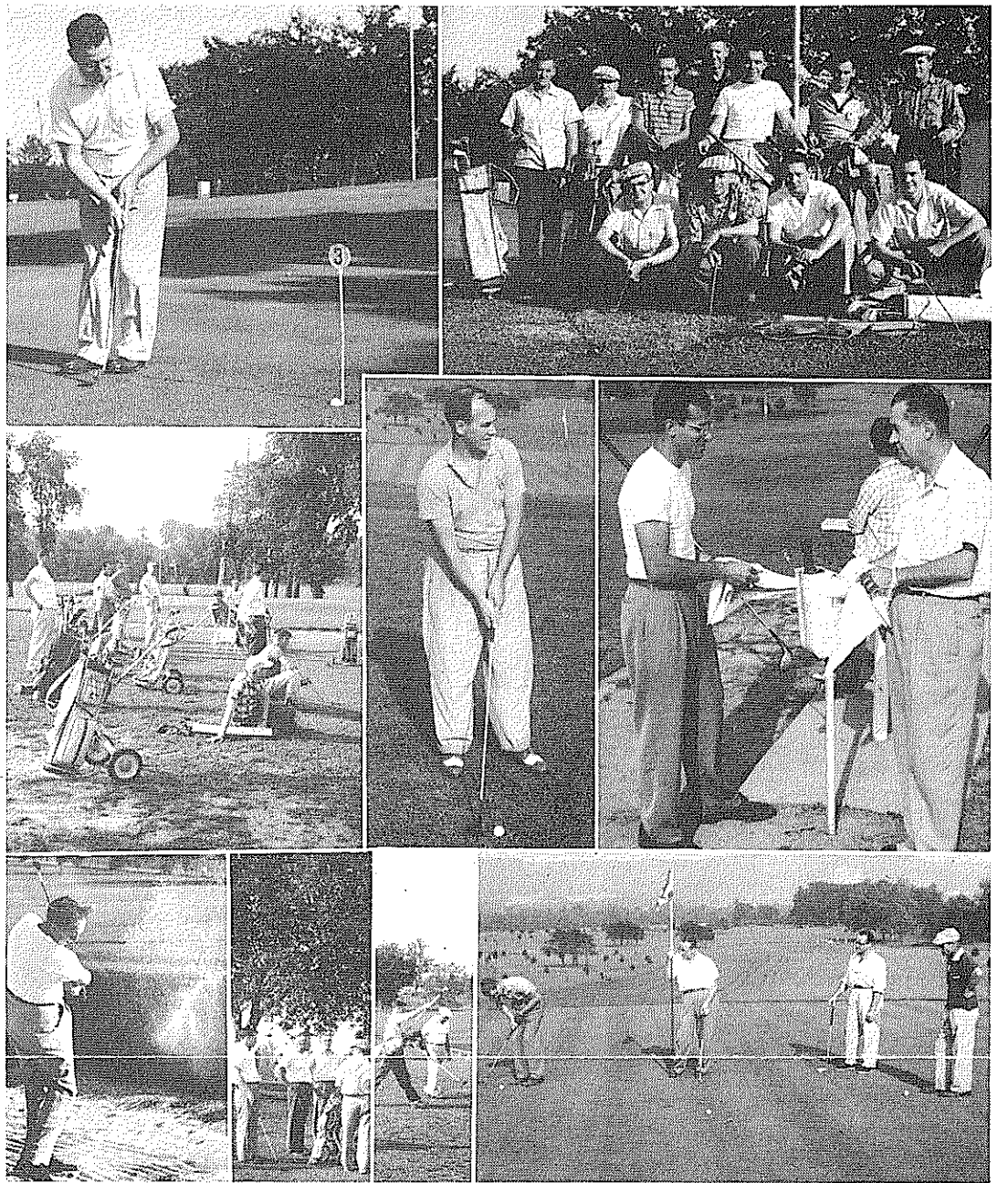
