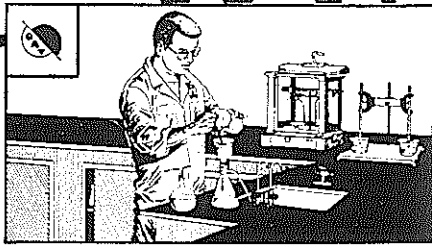

### RADIO SERIES ON SCIENCE BEING BROADCAST LOCALLY

#### Air Programs Twice Each Week; Interest High School Officials

A series of programs aimed at giving an insight into the sciences is being carried by three area radio stations.

S. D. Schneider, Subdivision 610, said radio station WPAY, Portsmouth, WPKO, Waverly, and WBEX, Chillicothe are now carrying two 15 minute programs a week which are aimed at presenting the science story.

One program consists of 15 minute scripts, narrated by Goodyear Atomic personnel, while the other is tape recorded by professional actors.

The scripts, entitled "Headlines in Chemistry", concern the developments in science that affects everyday living—medicine, biology, antibiotics, textiles, pharmaceuticals, etc.

The tapes, called "Objectives in Chemistry", are dramatizations of a major event or discovery in the field of chemistry.

The tapes and scripts are furnished on a weekly basis by the American Chemical Society Headquarters in New York.

High School authorities in the area have shown considerable interest in the programs. Arrangements are being made whereby students will be able to participate in future programs.

"The programs are very interesting," Schneider said, "and are very easy to understand."

He said he hoped the programs would interest young people in a career in the scientific field as well as be entertaining and informative to both young people and to adults.

#### Labor Relations

Max Warnock, committeeman for division 3, Local 10-689, Oil, Chemical and Atomic Workers, AFL-CIO, elected vice president of the Atomic Energy Workers Council at a meeting held last month in St. Louis.

The council consists of union representatives from each of the atomic energy installations in the country. Warnock said the purpose of the organization is to serve as a clearing house for information and make various recommendations to locals.

Four other local union men attended the St. Louis meeting. They were C. A. Romine, president, Local 10-689; Ed Hill, vice president; B. Hurley, trustee, and C. Martin, union safety committee representative.

#### Accident Interrupts GAT'S Safety Record; Mark Is Highest For This Type Plant

Although GAT's safety record has been broken, it is much more important that the employee involved was not hurt seriously. The safety record is secondary to the actual protection of the employees.

Goodyear Atomic employees can feel very proud of having attained a mark of nearly 3,700,000 man-hours without a lost time accident. This is by far the best safety record that ever has been established at any of the three gaseous diffusion plants.

The highest safety manhour figure ever achieved by either of the other two gaseous diffusion plants was 3,113,059 manhours at Oak Ridge.

Since GAT's record was broken under 3,000,000 manhours, employees will receive a gift valued at approximately \$5. The \$5 gift is given in recognition of the 3,000,000 safe manhours of work achieved.

The safety awards committee is scheduled to meet to establish the overall awards program. Employees will have an opportunity to select an award from approximately five items.

#### OEU Seeks Election; GAT States Position

The Goodyear Atomic Corporation has been informed by the National Labor Relations Board that the Office Employees International Union, Local 308, AFL-CIO, has petitioned for an election to determine whether it shall be designated as the collective bargaining representative for GAT office and clerical employees.

The petition for an election is subject to an investigation and hearing by the National Labor Relations Board to determine if an election should be conducted, and if so to establish those eligible to be included in an appropriate unit.

The Company does not feel that GAT office and clerical employees need a union to represent them in expressing their desires or wishes in the area of employee-employer relations.

#### Employee's Story Printed

A technical story written by a Goodyear Atomic Corporation employee has been published by the magazine *Analytical Chemistry*.

The story, entitled "Evaporator Feeder", was written by W. O. Phillips, Department 631, and appeared under the section, "Aids for the Analyst," in the February issue of *Analytical Chemistry*.

#### Slip On Badges Will Be Used In March; Obtain At Portals

Slip on badges will go into effect for employees of Goodyear Atomic Corporation on or about March 3. The slip on badge is placed over the present badge.

The badges will be obtained at the portals where the employees enter. When an employee leaves the plant at the end of his shift, the badge will be removed at that portal and given to the police officer on duty.

The security department announced that this badge procedure is in accordance with the security standards for the operation of a gaseous diffusion plant.

The slip on badges, which will be kept at the portal nearest the employees' work place, have been processed by the identification section.

## Goodyear Announces A Multi-Million Dollar Expansion Program

A \$100,000,000 expansion and improvement program, the largest capital investment yet to be undertaken by Goodyear, was announced recently by the company.

The program includes the erection of several new plants, as well as expansion and modernization of other plants and of the company's wholesale and retail distribution facilities.

Five new factories are under construction in overseas countries—Venezuela, Columbia, Australia, Scotland and Republic of Philippines.

The Venezuelan factory, seventh Goodyear plant in Latin America, is located at Los Guayos, near Valencia, and is scheduled for completion early in 1956.

The new plant in Columbia will replace the present factory in Cali, which has been in operation since 1945. Representing a greatly increased production capacity for Columbia, the new unit will be located at Yumbo, just outside Cali.

### Two In Australia

In Australia, a new tire factory, planned for construction at Melbourne, will become the second Goodyear plant to be located in that country. The company began manufacturing operations in Australia in

1927 when the present factory at Granville, N. S. W., was established.

The establishment of production organizations in Scotland and the Philippines brings to twenty-two, the number of countries throughout the world in which Goodyear products are manufactured. The factory in Scotland will be located at Glasgow, while in the Philippines, a site near Manila has been selected.

### Former GAT Employee

A former GAT employee is helping to launch the Scotland plant. He is A. J. Brust, who was superintendent of engineering control at GAT. He is doing similar work in the Scotland plant.

In the United States, the majority of the capital improvement funds have been allocated for additions to present factories.

In Akron, a \$3,500,000 capacity increase has been announced for the Chemigum and Resin plant, and a \$2,500,000 addition to the Airfoam plant now under construction. \$6,000,000 has been designated for expansion of the recently acquired synthetic rubber plants in Akron and Houston, Texas.

Other plant expansions are underway at the company's tire plant in

Jackson, Michigan, and at the chemical plant at Niagara Falls, New York.

### Research And Development

In keeping with the Goodyear research motto, "The Best Is Yet To Come", a fair share of the capital expenditure has been designated for expansion of the company's research and development program. A new \$3,300,000 research and development laboratory is under construction at the Goodyear Aircraft Corporation in Akron, while an aircraft and electronics laboratory is planned for GAC's plant at Litchfield Park, Arizona.

Expansion and modernization of Goodyear's product distribution facilities include a \$5,000,000 distribution center in the Cleveland area. To be known as the Goodyear Distribution Center, the new structure is believed to be the largest to be constructed by any company in the rubber industry, with nearly 17 acres of warehouse space under one roof. This giant warehouse holds special significance for the company, as it is destined to become an important shipping point for overseas outlets when the St. Lawrence Seaway project is completed.

The date seemed remote only at first glance . . . a few moments reflection brought an acute awareness that "early 1956" was a relatively short time in which to form an operating organization and to establish a working relationship with all the different groups which would have a part in this tremendous undertaking.

1956 is here, now. Rapport long has been established between all the varied contractors engaged in building this gaseous diffusion plant and the anticipated completion date is upon us.

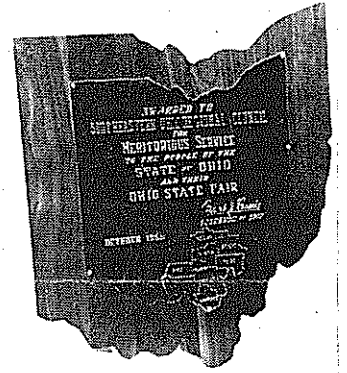

### Elmore-Henry

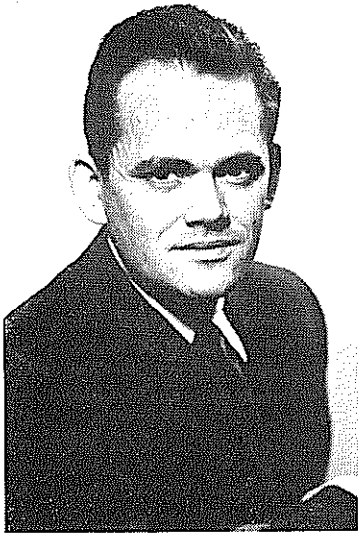

Jim Dysart, administrative assistant to the general manager, has been appointed council commissioner, Chief Logan Council, Boy Scouts of America.

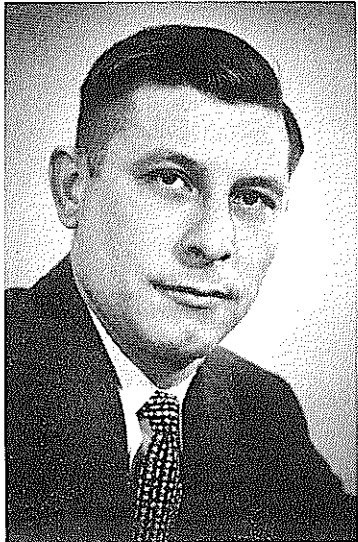
Dysart, who was active in Boy Scout activities in Akron, makes his home in Chillicothe. Mr. and Mrs. Dysart have two daughters and one son.

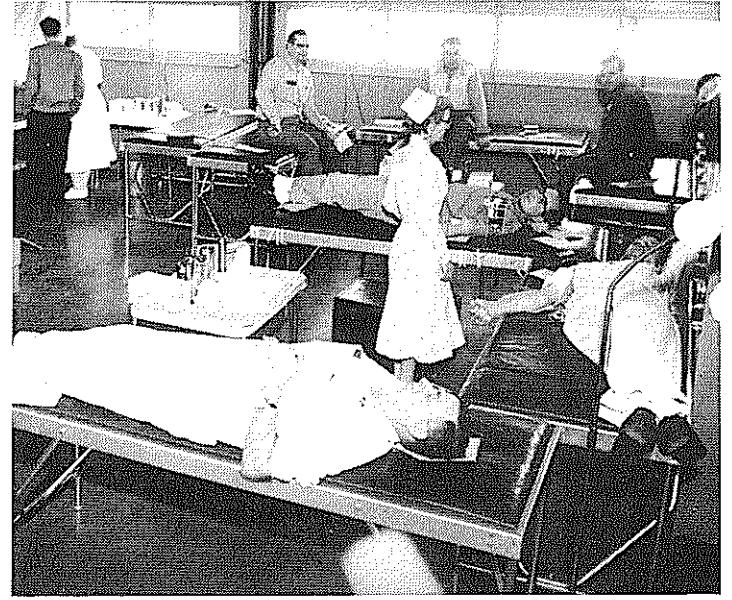

## Security Notes

Security at the Portsmouth Area Atomic Energy Plant covers more than just the individuals working at the plant.

Security is a family responsibility. It affects every member of the family, not just those employed by Goodyear Atomic.

This can be demonstrated very graphically. Suppose an employee inadvertently mentioned to his wife, mother, brother, or sister, or some other member of the family, a pertinent classified fact about this plant. The person to which this information is revealed, in making idle conversation, could very easily pass it on to other persons. They, in turn, could pass on the information to in-

dividuals who do not have the best interest of the United States at heart. It could—from the second person on—get well out of hand and become much more serious.

Security can be a very elusive thing. It often times is hard to put down in black and white what security is and isn't.

Security is defined by one dictionary as, "a quality or condition of being secure, specifically: freedom from exposure to danger, protection; safety or a place of safety." Certainly these are apropos at the Portsmouth Area Atomic Energy Plant.

That is why security is a family responsibility.

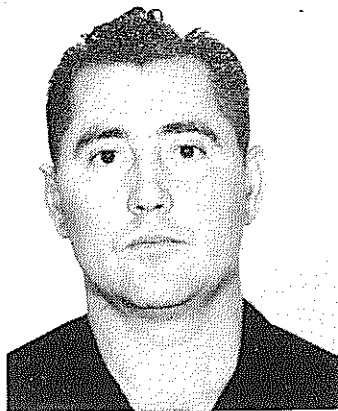
## Walder Is Presented 10 Year Service Pin

It is anticipated that an orchestra will be secured from either Huntington or Columbus.

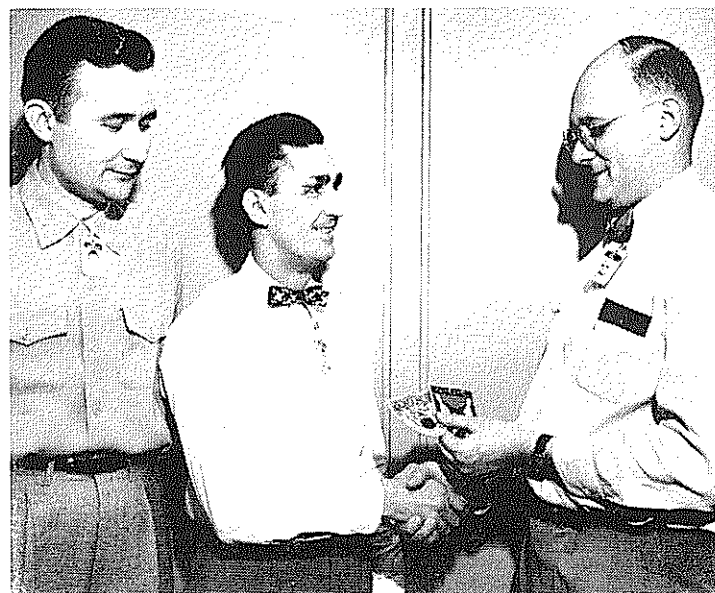
Further details on the dance will appear on the bulletin boards and in the March edition of the *Clan*.

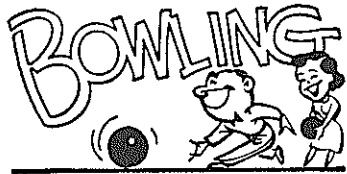

The deadline for entering a team in this handicap tournament is February 28. Entry blanks should be requested from, and returned to, the recreation department.

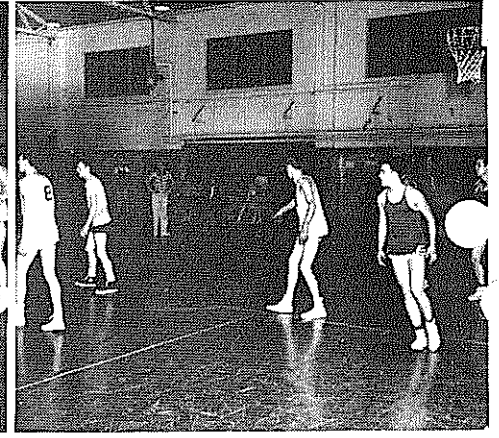
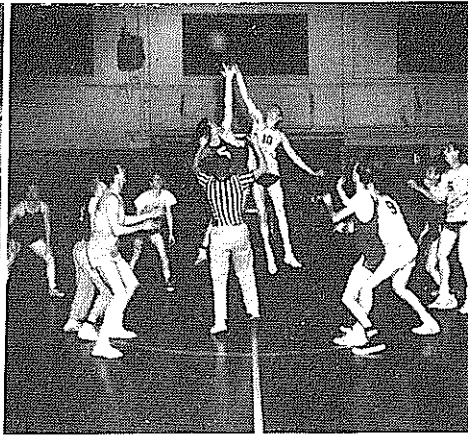

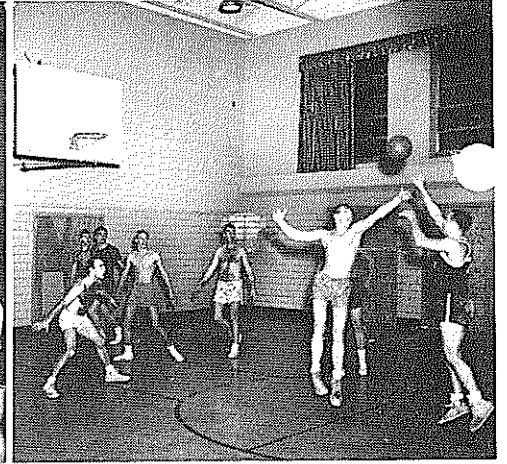
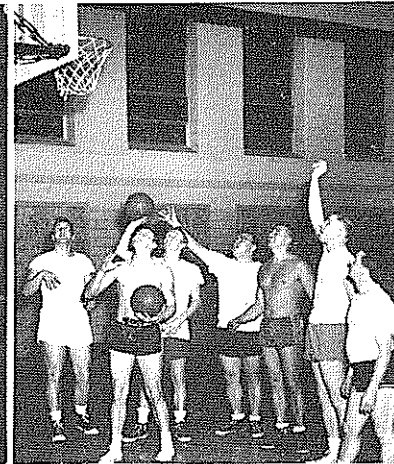
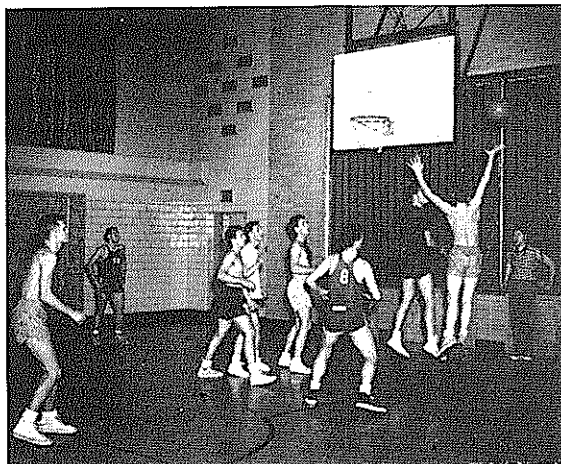
Each team will be given a starting time and will start each game on the alleys assigned by the recreation department. All women teams in the various GAT leagues are urged to participate in this handicap tournament.
