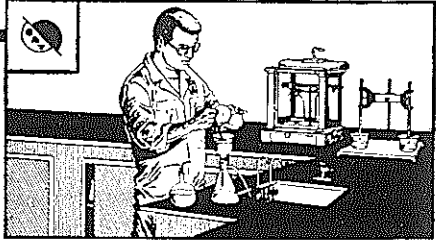

### Bloodmobile Visit To Be July 10 And 11; Program Insures Blood When Needed

Goodyear Atomic employees will have the opportunity to participate actively in the Blood Insurance Program when the bloodmobile visits plantsite for the seventh semi-annual visit Tuesday and Wednesday, July 10 and 11.

The twice a year visit of the bloodmobile insures an adequate supply of blood for GAT employees and their families whenever the vital fluid is needed.

This visit, like the January visit, will be held in the GAT fire station. Donor hours will be from 8:30 a. m. until 3 p. m.

Donors will be scheduled from employees who have signed pledge cards. Persons not scheduled but wishing to donate will be welcomed as "walk-in" donors at anytime during the two-day visit.

Scheduled donors who will be unable to keep their appointment are urged to contact community relations, telephone extension 2166, at the earliest possible moment. This will allow the department to schedule another donor.

### Atomic Employees Credit Union Highly Successful; Employees Urged To Join

The Atomic Employees Credit Union is proving highly successful in the few short months it has been in operation.

"In fact," A. H. Clary, president of the credit union, said, "the supply of money available isn't sufficient to meet the demands."

"We have need for a considerable amount of money to fulfill the requests for loans."

Employees who have joined the credit union currently are depositing approximately \$12,500 a month.

"Present indications," Clary said, "are that the credit union should be operating at a profit beginning with this month. We broke even last month."

#### Memberships

Memberships in the credit union are of two types—individual or joint. Individual memberships cost 25 cents. There is a 25 cent membership fee for each co-owner.

Members may make deposits in cash or through payroll deduction. To

facilitate bookkeeping, a minimum of \$1 per payroll period has been established for payroll deduction.

Shares in the credit union cost \$5 and are issued at the end of the month for each \$5 that has been accumulated during that month.

Clary urged those who have been thinking of joining the credit union to do so now. He said cash deposits up to \$3,000 will be accepted and can be conveniently used at this time.

### Anticipate Over 7,000 To Attend; New Rides, Other Facilities Added

A request has been made of the weatherman to have a warm sunny day June 30.

R. F. Jones, general chairman of Goodyear Atomic's 1956 picnic committee, placed the order for decent weather several weeks ago.

Chairman Jones asked for June 30, because that is the day the third annual company picnic will be held at Camden Park, a mile west of Huntington, West Virginia.

The third picnic is expected to attract between 7,000 and 8,000 people—employees and their families.

The park will be reserved for Goodyearites only, from 10 a. m. to 5 p. m. Free rides will be from noon (12 o'clock) to 5 p. m.

#### Additional Rides

"There have been some changes made at the park this year," Chairman Jones said. "Three additional rides for children under six have been added and the large lake has been converted into a recreation area. The area can be used for the various events planned for the day."

Employees will be given two refreshment tickets for each member of the family attending the picnic. These tickets are good for snow cones, pop corn, frozen custard, pop, and cotton candy.

Identification tags, a grand drawing ticket for employees only, and refreshment tickets will be given to employees prior to the picnic day. Those attending the picnic will attach the tags—after printing their names on them—to their clothing as a means of identifying themselves.

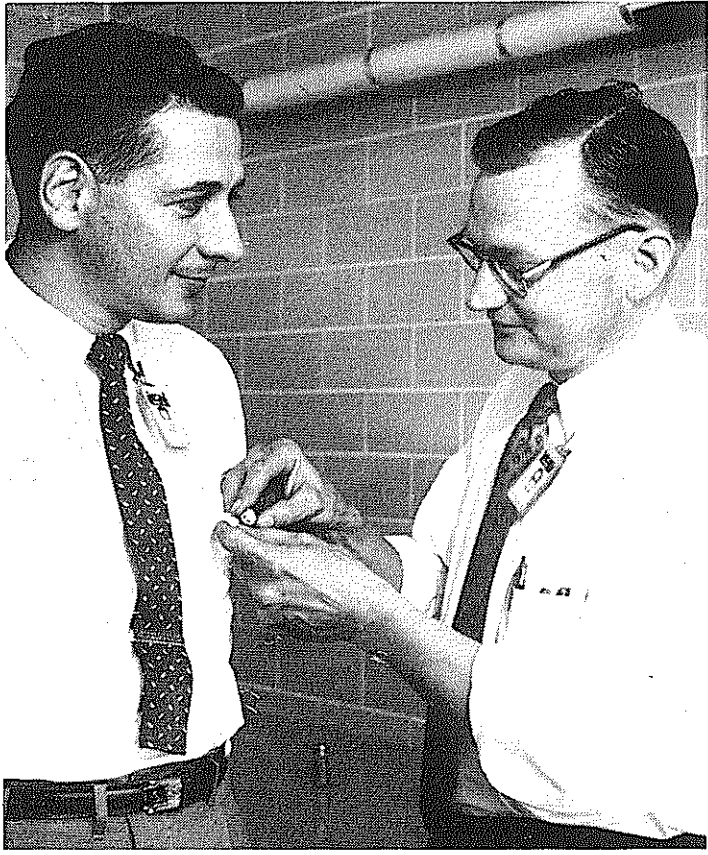
The grand drawing prize tickets are perforated which permit easy

## A SPECIAL AWARD OF MERIT

The men and women of Goodyear Atomic Corporation can take pride in the award presented last month to A. J. Gracia, former GAT general manager.

He was presented the Paul W. and Florence B. Litchfield Award of Merit "for his leadership in putting the Atomic Energy Commission's billion dollar Pike County gaseous diffusion plant into operation efficiently, on schedule and in accordance with exacting demands of the government."

The award came as a complete surprise to him.

"What was accomplished," Gracia said, "was done because men of goodwill were all about us. They put the above and beyond their individual littleness.

"I accept this award for Goodyear Atomic, in which we all share."

Gracia is the 27th man to be honored with the gold medal award, symbolic of "exceptional and outstanding" accomplishment, since inception of the program 30 years ago.

Of the previous award winners, two sacrificed their life in performance of heroic acts that brought the medals as posthumous awards; eleven were for life saving; seven for outstanding product development; two for aviation, and the remainder for other notable acts.

The fact that the award is made only when the accomplishment is deemed to be "exceptional and outstanding" speaks well for the job the men and women of GAT are doing.

Gracia's receipt of the award, as he said, is an honor to every employee.

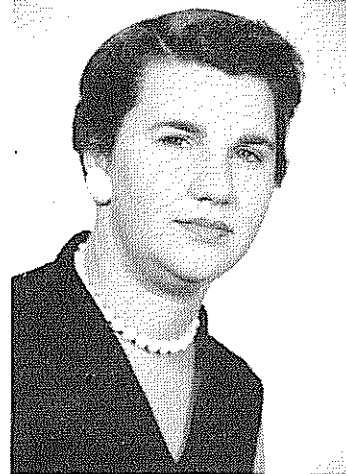

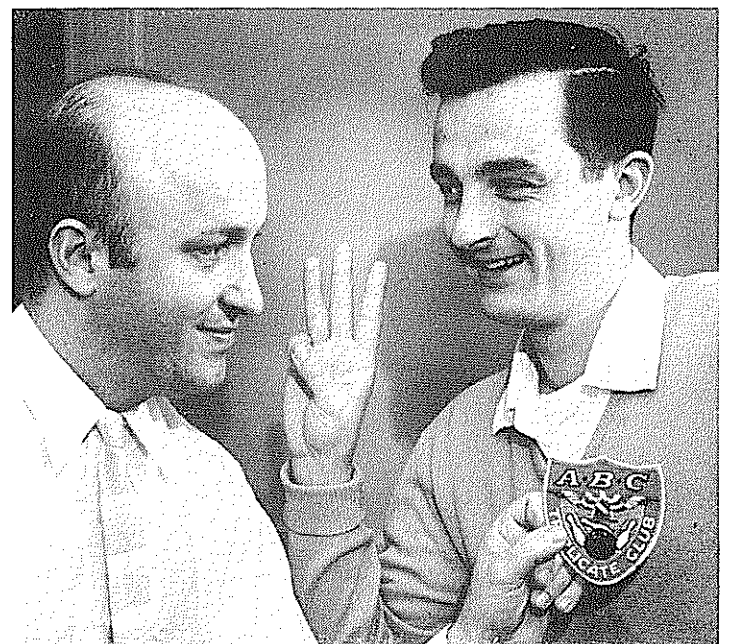

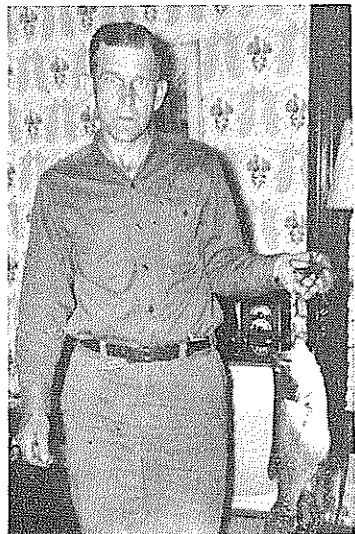

He succeeds his older brother, Wade, who served in that same capacity on last year's team.

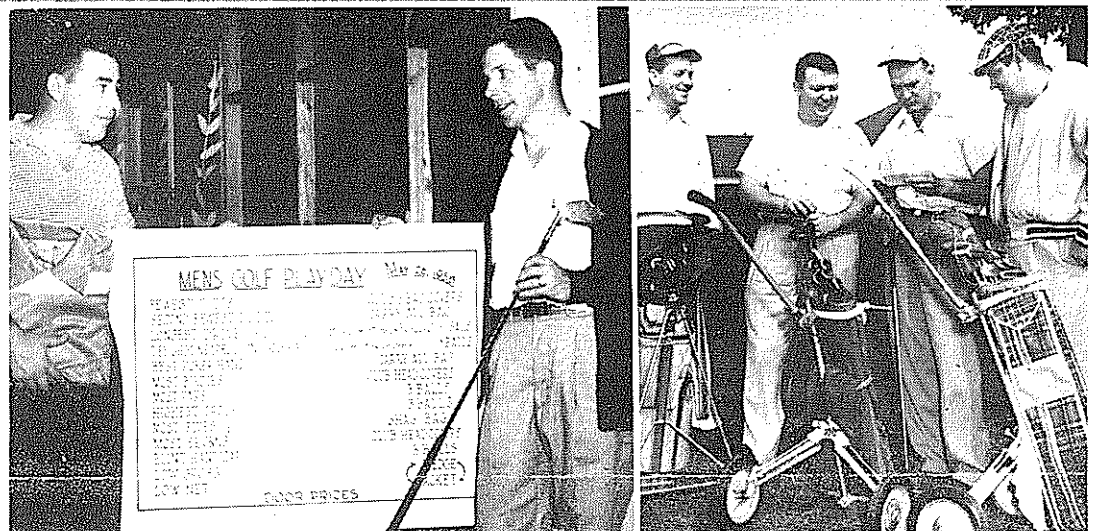
