Forgetting Picture Badge Can Cause Delay, Inconvenience At Plant Portal

Security at this plant is the prime concern of every Goodyear Atomic employee.

A major facet of GAT's security program is the take-home and slip-on picture badges, which each employee is required to wear. Without the take-home badge a person cannot gain entrance to the plant.

If employees lose or forget their take-home badges it means being held up at the plant entrance while the police department checks the records for clearance. This delay can result in loss of time on the job and in some cases loss of pay.

Plant protection records show that Monday is the day most employees forget to bring their badges to work. During the month of July over one percent of the employees forgot their badges on that day. Percentages during the other days of the week are not as high as on Mondays.

The monthly total, though, becomes quite high when figured in the amount of the employees' own time lost at the portal entrances.

The plant protection department suggests that employees become more security badge conscious and develop a method whereby they won't forget their badges.

Keeps Record Intact; Francis Lauds Group For Safety Job Done

D Shift, for the second consecutive year, won Goodyear Atomic Corporation's annual shift safety award.

The annual shift safety plaque was presented to Roy Engler, D Shift superintendent, by D. H. Francis, general manager of Goodyear Atomic Corporation.

"It gives me great pleasure to present this to you," Francis said. "The record of your shift is an excellent tribute to the fine work you and your people are doing.

"Safety is of vital importance in this operation and you have contributed to its success."

Engler, in accepting the award on behalf of his shift, said, "It gives me a great deal of satisfaction to accept this trophy for the second time. The acceptance of this award has been made possible by the cooperation of line supervision and the men performing the various operations, who have worked for approximately 481,000 manhours during the past year without a disabling injury."

The shift safety award is an important part of Goodyear Atomic's comprehensive safety program. The award is made after a 20-day waiting period which is the required waiting time to check any accidents that might become lost time injuries.

Continuous Record

The safety award is based on continuous accident-free hours and as a result D Shift actually won the award this year because of an accident-free year during fiscal 1955. During this fiscal year not one member of a regular rotating shift sustained a disabling injury which necessitated going back to fiscal year 1955 to determine the winner.


D Shift, which numbers over 200 men, worked approximately 481,000 manhours between July 1, 1955, and June 30, 1956. This takes their continuous record to over 800,000 accident-free manhours as D Shift won the award for the fiscal year 1955 by



Vending Machines Play Important Role; **Supply Many Edible Items To Employees**

Plantsite vending machines are playing an important role in the service of edible items to Goodyear Atomic's 2600 employees.

More than 200 of these mechanical dispensers are scattered about the many buildings at this plant.

The machines, which come under the jurisdiction of the cafeteria and the personnel services subdivision, serve a very useful purpose by supplying employees with various food and drink.

W. M. Armstrong, supervisor, employment department, said the most popular machines are the ones containing coffee, soft drinks, milk, candy, and penny chewing gum.
"Of course," he said, "our other

machines also are very important as they supply many of our shift employees with their meals."

The other machines are those that contain sandwiches, soups, pastries, and ice cream. Cigarette machines also are popular and considered a "must" by many employees.

Armstrong said the X-720 Building has the most complete vending equipment. This, he explained, is because of two things: one, the heavy concentration of personnel in that building and the surrounding areas, and two, because most shift employees have easier access to that building.

"Soup, sandwiches, and pastry machines serve a real need in cases like these," the personnel man explained. 'That is why the sandwich and soup machines are placed in the X-720 and X-330 Buildings."

Armstrong urged employees to be patient if a machine breaks down. After all, he said, when they are mechanically inoperative it serves no
