


Miss Ferguson, who hopes to follow a career in social work, plans to attend the college of Mount St. Joseph On-the-Ohio.

At Notre Dame, she is secretary of the Glee Club and the Sodality and a member of the choir of the Catholic Student Mission Crusade. She was class secretary in her sophomore year.

Miss Ferguson will represent Scioto County in the state wide contest scheduled later this month at Columbus.



Goodyearite Is TV Singer

A member of GAT's tabulating services department, Frances Bowen, has become a weekend television performer.

Miss Bowen is a soloist with the "Saturday Night Jamboree", a Western-type program telecast by WSAZ-TV, Channel 3, in Huntington. In addition to her singing on this program, she also has made personal appearances with other members of the cast and performed recently at the opening of a new TV station in Williamson, W. Va.

Miss Bowen is also heard on the Zeke Mullins show, a Portsmouth radio program. "Thirty years sounds like a long time, but the variety of the jobs and the different types of plants to which I have been assigned have kept any of it from becoming monotonous."

That's the way L. M. (Pat) Crow, process area 3, sums up a career with Goodyear which spans 30 years.

Crow's Goodyear service started in 1927 when he joined the production squadron in Akron. He graduated from the squadron in 1930, but was associated with the squadron until 1935, working on production lines wherever temporary bottlenecks occurred.


The next three years Crow terms the most interesting in his Goodyear career. He travelled throughout most of the country for the advertising department, visiting Goodyear dealers and putting up large signs, decals, cardboard displays and similar identification materials. As interesting as this assignment was, Crow said that he was happy to be transferred to retail stores assignments in Florida because he was married while on this assignment and the constant travel lost much of its appeal.

His work in the Goodyear stores in Florida lasted for almost four years, ending when he moved back to Akron, just before Pearl Harbor in 1941, to join the production section of the synthetic rubber plant. He remained on this assignment for the duration of the war, moving into white sidewall tire production in 1946.

Crow was transferred to GAT in February, 1953.

This plant is the fourth which he has helped to starr in his 30-year career. The others were Gadsden in 1929, the Chemigum plant in Akron in 1942, and the Rubber Reserve synthetic rubber plant in Akron, also in 1942.

Mr. and Mrs. Crow and two sons live in Jackson. A third son is a sophomore at Ohio University.

The coupling uses air to operate a clamp ring which closes on grooves cut into the ends of the two pipes. As the ends of the pipes are forced together, they become embedded in a replaceable gasket made from teflon or soft aluminum which completes the seal between the pipes.


