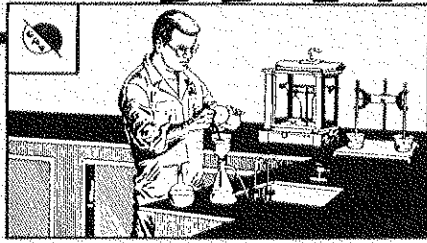

#### Science Clubs Of America To Conduct 18th Annual Science Talent Search

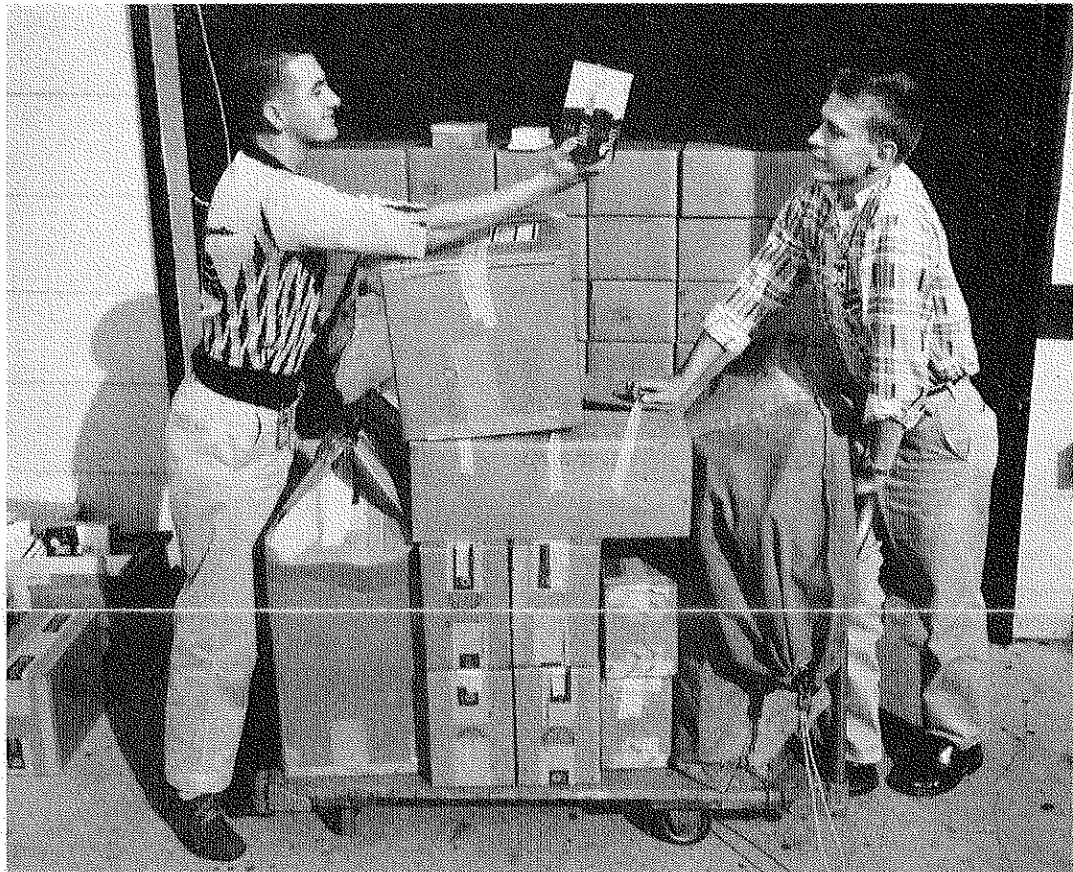
Exceptional high school seniors will be given an opportunity to enter the Eighteenth Annual Science Talent Search being conducted by Science Clubs of America.

The awards include 40 all-expense paid trips to Washington for the Science Talent Institute and \$34,500 in Westinghouse Science Scholarships and Awards.

America needs to discover and develop all possible talent for scientific and engineering creativeness. The 40 winners and almost every one of the Honorable Mentions will receive offers of valuable scholarships.

In 32 or more states the entries in the National Science Talent Search will be used later in the spring by state organizations to conduct State Science Talent Searches. Through these extensions of the National Search, additional hundreds of talented young scientists will be singled out for further educational opportunities and encouragement in science.

Any boy or girl who is in his last year in an accredited secondary school (public, private, parochial), who is expected by the certifying school official to complete college entrance qualifications before October 1, 1959, and who has not competed in any previous Science Talent Search is eligible to enter this competition.

## HAPPY HEARTS BENEFIT DANCE

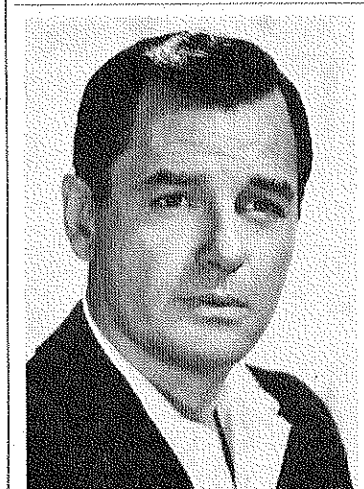

## Safety Record Broken

The safety record at Goodyear Atomic Corporation was broken at approximately 584,989 man-hours. The latest figure covered the period of time from September 4, 1958 through October 16, 1958.

On October 16, an employee from the instrument maintenance department was repairing a leak in a water line. He slipped from a ladder causing him to fall to the floor. He was taken to the GAT Hospital for treatment and released prior to the end of the shift. The following day he returned to work, however, he was unable to report for work on his next regularly scheduled shift October 18, which resulted in the injury being classified as a temporary total disabling industrial injury.

This is the second disabling injury in less than a year which resulted from the improper use of a ladder.

## Facts About Safety

Falls are the second most frequent source of accidental death in the United States, according to the National Safety Council. They cause nearly 21,000 deaths a year. Number one accidental killer: motor vehicle accidents.

Accidents are the leading cause of death to persons 1-36 years of age.

Motor vehicle accidents take the lives of a person every 14 minutes. One person is injured in a motor vehicle mishap every 23 seconds.

More than twice as many males as females are killed each year in accidents.

Each week 81,000 persons are injured in home accidents — an average of an injury every eight seconds. More than four million persons are hurt in home accidents annually, and about 28,000 persons are killed.

About 28,000 persons die annually in home accidents, according to the National Safety Council, while half that number die each year in work accidents. One person in 40 is injured each year in a home accident.

More than half of the pedestrians killed annually in auto accidents reportedly jaywalked or acted in an otherwise unsafe manner.

ready being received on plantsite. Children attending the party will be given a choice of gifts. The gifts have been selected with great care and for specific age groups.

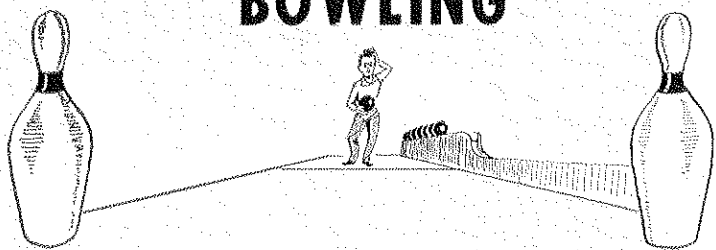

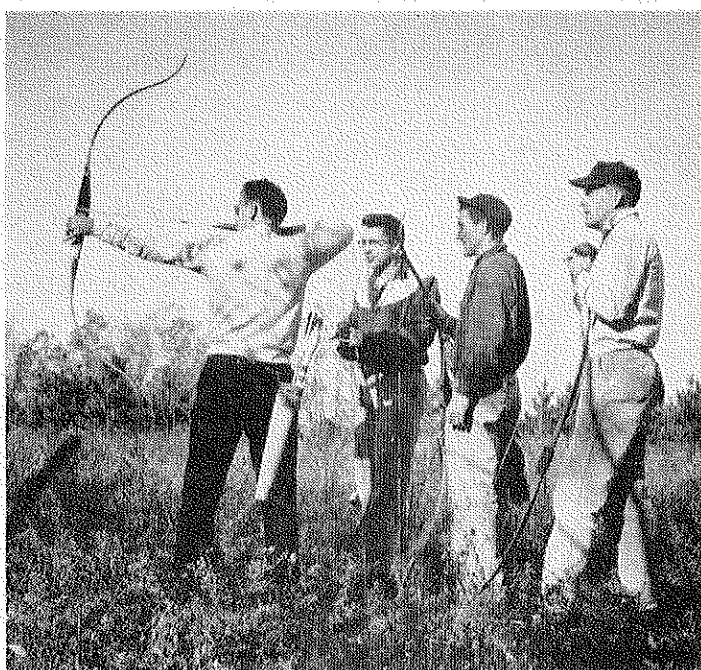
