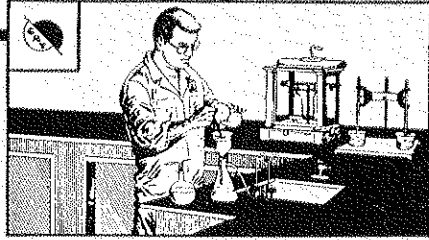

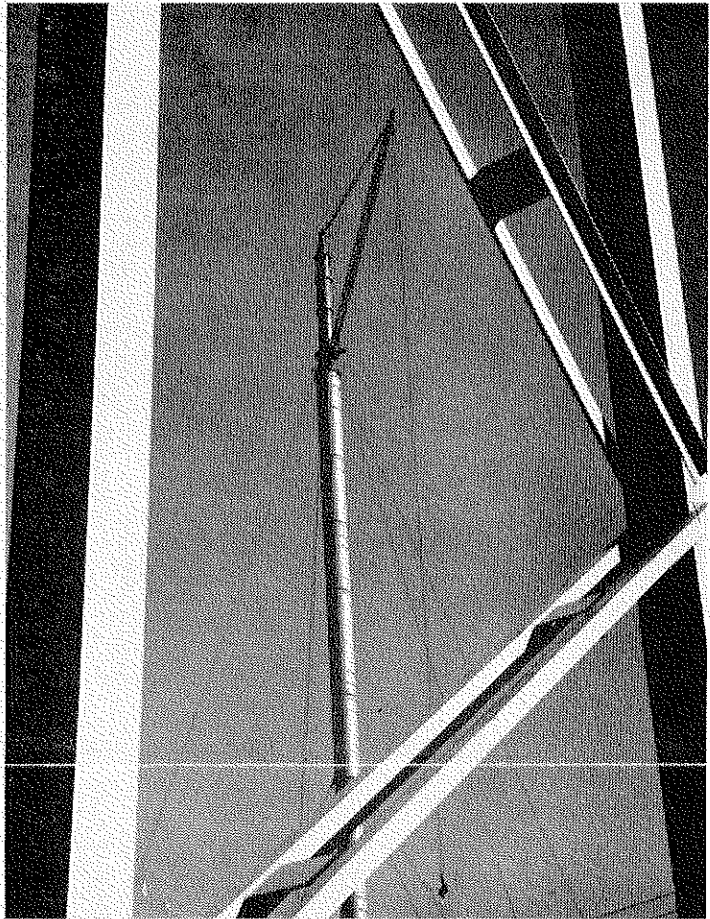

New GAT Water Tank Being Installed For Process Automatic Sprinkler Systems

The GAT Water Tank is the central factor in construction of the Process Building Sprinkler System. The tank job is the responsibility of AEC through the Architectural Engineers, A. G. McKee and Company. The prime contractor is the Chicago Bridge and Iron Company.

The tank tower is being constructed between the X-720 and X-330 buildings. The last phase of the job, which is about 55 percent complete, will be the assembling of a 300,000 gallon water tank on top of the tower. Over-all height of the tower will be 262 feet. The tank will add 38 feet to the over-all height for a total of 300 feet. The work is scheduled for completion in the early spring of 1959.

GAT representatives on the job are R. L. Shepherd and W. L. Hewitt, plant engineering, who act as liaison between AEC and construction contractors. G. M. Orihood, F. Buckalew, and E. L. La Barge, fire protection engineering, have the responsibility of reviewing all specifications and drawings for the Sprinkler System.

NSPE — ARMCO Offer College Scholarships

The National Society of Professional Engineers, through local chapters, is contacting high schools in the four-county area in an attempt to interest students in civil engineering.

A number of scholarships have been provided for students in civil engineering by the Armco Foundation, Inc., at the request of Armco Drainage and Metal Products, Inc. They have asked NSPE to administer the scholarship plan. Representatives from NSPE and Armco worked out the procedures. The National Society is requesting the assistance and cooperation of the state officers and the local chapters of NSPE to participate in the administration of this scholarship plan.

The Armco Foundation is providing five, \$3,000, civil engineering scholarships during the school term beginning in the fall of 1959. The recipients may attend the accredited college or university of their choice. Each scholarship will provide \$750 per year for four years, or, if preferred, \$600 per year for five years. The Armco Foundation will make an additional grant of \$100 per year to the institution chosen by the recipient for the period of the scholarship, in the case of a tax sponsored institution, or \$500 per year for a privately endowed institution.

A National Selection Committee appointed by NSPE and Armco will make the final selection of the scholarship winners based on financial need; high school record (applicant must be in the top 25 percent of his class); NSPE Chapter recommendations; and rating in aptitude and psychological tests.

High schools in the area are being acquainted with the scholarship program. In Scioto County, Mr. Edward Fournier, Principal, Portsmouth High School; Mr. James Warren, Principal, Glenwood High School, New Boston; Father Omer Shroeder, Principal, Notre Dame High School, Portsmouth; and Mr. Edward McCowen, Superintendent, Scioto County Schools, will accept applications for consideration.

High School students in Ross, Pike, and Jackson Counties may apply through Elmer S. Barrett Associates, civil engineers, Chillicothe. Applications must be submitted by the last week in December.

W. A. Smith, mechanical inspection department, is President of the Portsmouth Chapter, National Society of Professional Engineers. Mr. Smith will appoint a committee of registered civil engineers who will screen applicants for the Portsmouth Chapter.

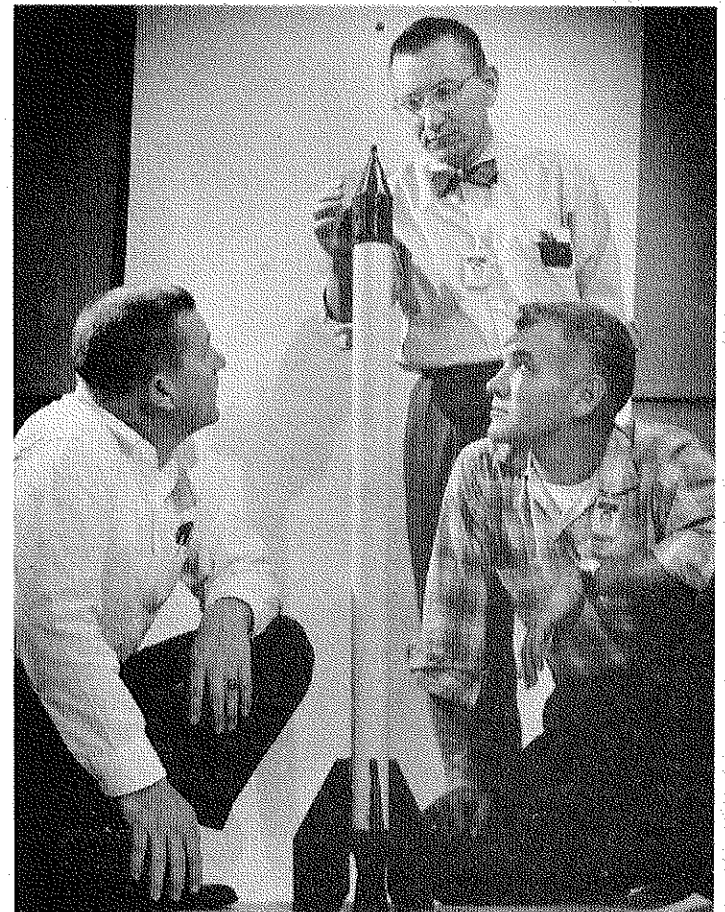
The ticket which is enclosed with this issue of the *Clan* will admit the entire family.

SAFETY SLOGAN AWARD WINNERS

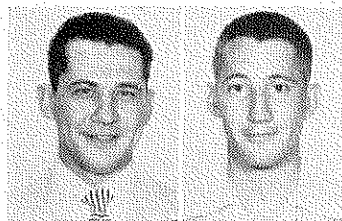

Tenth World Scout Jamboree July 17-26

The Tenth World Scout Jamboree will be held July 17-26 in the Philippine Islands.

Site of the jamboree will be in Makiling National Park, some 40 miles south of Manila. The camp will be at an elevation of 1,000 feet, and is adjacent to the University of the Philippines' colleges of agriculture and forestry.

Any Scout between the ages of 14 and 17, and experienced campers holding First Class rank or better and having merit badges for cooking and camping, are eligible.

Each applicant accepted will be expected to typify the Scout spirit, enabling him to represent American ideals at their best. He also will be required to show a physician's certificate of fitness.

Three tours are available to jamboree campers. The first, which includes pre-jamboree training, will be from July 8-30 and includes a tour of Hawaii, the Philippines and Japan. Cost is \$1,450 from the West Coast point of departure.

The second tour — from July 8 to August 4 — includes stops at Hawaii, the Philippines, Japan, Thailand and Hong Kong at a cost of \$1,600.

The third, a round-the-world tour costing \$2,475, has stops at Honolulu, Tokyo, Manila, Bangkok, Calcutta, Darjeeling, Delhi, Agra, Bombay, Cairo, Athens, Istanbul, Rome, London, and New York.

Applications for the jamboree and any of the tours must be received at the Boy Scouts of America National Office by December 31, along with an initial payment of \$200 for either of the first two tours and \$500 for the round-the-world trip.

It is estimated that 12,000 scouts and leaders will attend the Tenth Annual World Jamboree.

When the tower and tank have been completed it will be approximately 100 feet above the present water tower and tank, which is 201 feet. A flashing beacon will be located on the top as required by CAA Regulations for structures of this height.

Don't Get Careless About Your Driving

Too often the routine of everyday life is taken for granted. When this happens we are inclined to become careless and disregard the safety precautions necessary to avoid serious injury.

Let's look at a GAT car-pool as an example . . . a car-pool leaving Greenfield, Ohio, each morning of a work-week. Occupants of this car are W. G. Kensinger, central files department; E. W. Badgely, property records department; and H. F. Tudor, mechanical inspection department. What's so unusual about this car-pool you say . . . we have hundreds of car-pools at GAT. Listen to this. Greenfield is approximately 49 miles from plantsite. Leaving Greenfield the car travels State Route 41 to Lapperil Road, a County road, which leads to State Route 124, the road traveled to the north across road outside the perimeter road. Traveling this route the car has crossed the D.T.&I. Railway seven times. It goes under the railroad south of Piketon. This roadway to work subjects the occupants of the car to this type of hazard 14 times a day . . . 70 times per week . . . and 3,640 times per year. The railway crossings are all between Greenfield and Bainbridge, a distance of approximately 13 miles. None of the crossings have flashing signals.

Badgely and Tudor, who are charter members in this car-pool, estimate that they have traveled 125,000 miles in the five year period they have worked at GAT.

What's so important about this? Those of us who share rides with fellow employees need to stop and think of the importance of concentrating on our driving when we are at the wheel. Obey the rules of the road. Observe driver courtesy at all times. Practice the golden rule . . . especially when we have the responsibility for someone's safety in our car. Never relax good driving habits.

A good place to begin is the parking lot outside the portal gates.

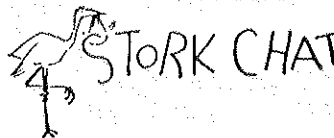

Tell Your Story Where It Counts

You'll stand a much better chance of obtaining desirable tax rate reforms from the 86th Congress if you write your Congressman.

1. Fancy letters or long letters aren't necessary. The simpler and shorter, the better.

2. It's a good idea to mention the bills in question by their numbers. This distinguishes them from bills on the same subjects.

3. A senator should be addressed as "The Honorable John Smith, United States Senate, Washington, D. C." A representative should be addressed as "The Honorable John Smith, House of Representatives, Washington, D. C."

4. In the letter you may say "Dear Mr. Senator," or "Dear Mr. Representative," or just plain "Dear Mr. Smith."

U. S. — EURATOM In Cooperation Pact

An Agreement for Cooperation in the civil uses of atomic energy between the United States and the six-nation European Atomic Energy Community (EURATOM) was signed in November at Brussels. The agreement has as its major objective the bringing into operation in the Community in the next five to seven years of approximately 1,000,000 electrical kilowatts of nuclear power capacity, using reactor types developed in the United States.

It is expected that the program will provide industrial organization in the Community and the United States with valuable engineering experience.

An integral part of the program is a joint 10-year research and development project. During the first five years the Community and the United States will each contribute up to \$50,000,000 to this program. Before the expiration of the first five years the participants will determine the financial requirements for the remaining five years and will undertake to procure the necessary funds for the program.

The nations which make up the Community are Belgium, France, The Republic of Germany, Italy, Luxembourg, and The Netherlands.

The U. S. EURATOM Agreement is regarded as one of the most notable achievements in President Eisenhower's Atoms-For-Peace program.

Get Set — Income Tax Forms To Be Mailed

The largest direct mailing of Federal income tax forms in the history of the Columbus collection district has been announced by the District Director of Internal Revenue.

A total of 555,217 tax returns (Form 1040 and 1040A) for area taxpayers will be placed in the mail the latter part of December.

The annual job of designing the tax forms has been completed by the Forms Committee of the Washington headquarters of the Revenue Service.

The presses of the Government Printing Office now are turning out the forms.

Returns for the Columbus District taxpayers alone will require 57,220 pounds of paper. That is enough to make a single sheet large enough to cover 99 acres.

Taxpayers will receive one of four Form 1040 packages of forms, schedules and instructions, or the card Form 1040A, depending on the amount and type of income reported by each taxpayer on his last year's return.

A revised Form 1040A, allowing most taxpayers with an income of less than \$10,000 to file on the simple card form was announced earlier. The former income limit was up to \$5,000.

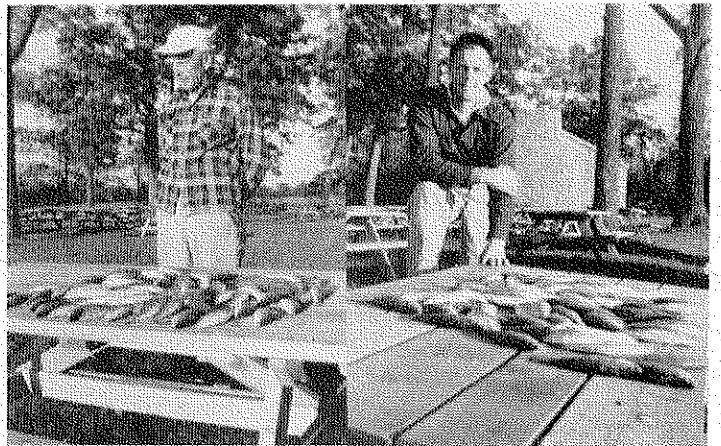

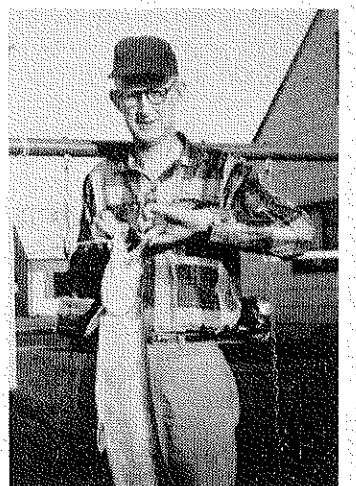
