
D. W. Doner, manager, industrial relations division, welcomed the ministers on behalf of his division.





Resolutions are usually made on one day and forgotten the next day. We would like to suggest a resolution for yearround consideration.

This month Goodyear Atomic Corporation completes its seventh year. On September 18, 1952, it was announced that The Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company would operate the Atomic Energy Commission's newest gaseous diffusion plant "somewhere in Pike County." In December of the same year, the first construction equipment moved onto the plantsite area.

At the beginning of 1955, process operation had begun. During the year additional process units were put into production as the construction of the buildings was completed.

Nineteen hundred and fifty-six was a full and active year. Many items of significance occurred at Goodyear Atomic Corporation . . . the most notable, perhaps, was the estimated construction savings of \$400,000,000 of the taxpayers money as a result of good labor relations, good weather, and excellent coordination and cooperation of all contractors.

The operating contract between the Atomic Energy Commission and Goodyear Atomic was renewed during 1957. The renewal was announced a year in advance of the expiration of the first contract. The new five-year contract became effective January 21, 1957, with an expiration date of June 30, 1961.

Goodyear Atomic has continued to cooperate, wherever possible, with all of the health, welfare, and educational organizations within the counties surrounding the plantsite. The Company has, within the limits of security, told the story of the Portsmouth Area gaseous diffusion to thousands of its neighbors and, in accord with good management, put the special skills of specialized personnel at the disposal of worthwhile community efforts.

Goodyear Atomic Corporation, as a source of supply for fissionable materials, has contributed significantly to the Atoms for Peace Program.

These are but a few of the accomplishments in the past seven years. Now, a look to the future.

50% if 60 and less than 65; to 25% if 65 and less than 70; and to noth ing if 70 or over. These percentages also apply to anyone 55 or over on September 1, 1959, when the policy became effective. This would double the savings up to \$2,000 for the beneficiary in case of a shareholders death.

Individuals having savings accounts in excess of \$2,000, it is recommended that the account be divided with other members of the family. This will allow full advantage of the life insurance feature.


Today the AIEE represents the widespread interests of engineers in the whole field of electrical engineering, defining their contributions, and unifying their efforts in professional




