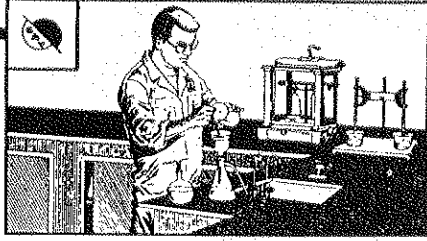

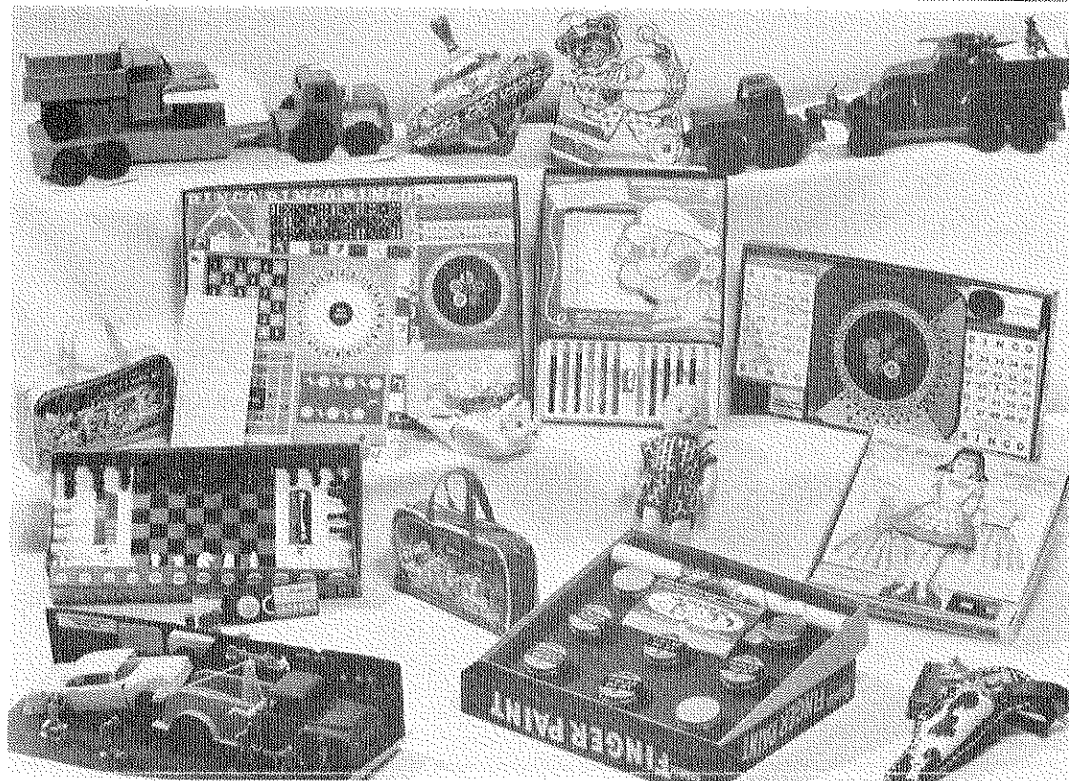
### Dr. Seaborg Gets Enrico Fermi Award

Dr. Glenn T. Seaborg, who discovered plutonium, is the winner of the \$50,000 Enrico Fermi Award for 1959.

The Atomic Energy Commission which administers the award, said that Seaborg was recommended by the AEC's general advisory committee and the choice was approved by President Eisenhower.

Seaborg, 47, is chancellor of the University of California. The citation said the scientist was honored "for discoveries of plutonium and several additional elements and for leadership in the development of nuclear chemistry and atomic energy."

Plutonium is a radioactive element that undergoes an explosive chain reaction in an atomic bomb.

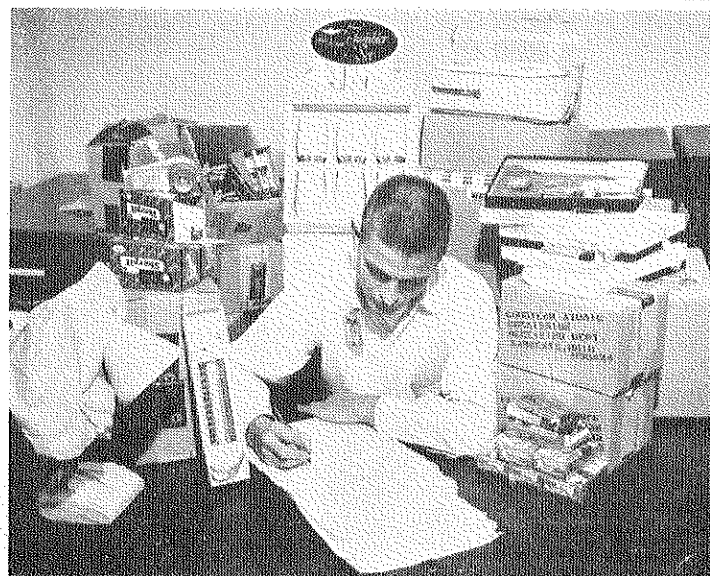

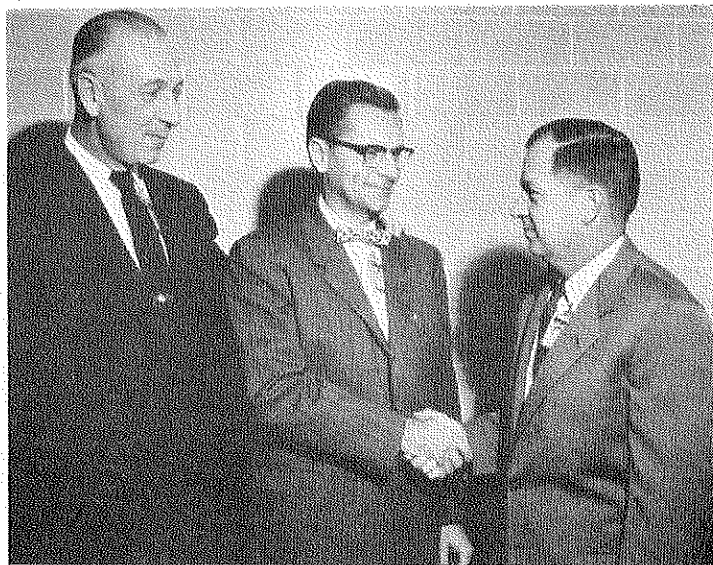
The Chorus will be under the direction of Marian Shawkey, employment department. Linda Russell, OVEC, will be the pianist.

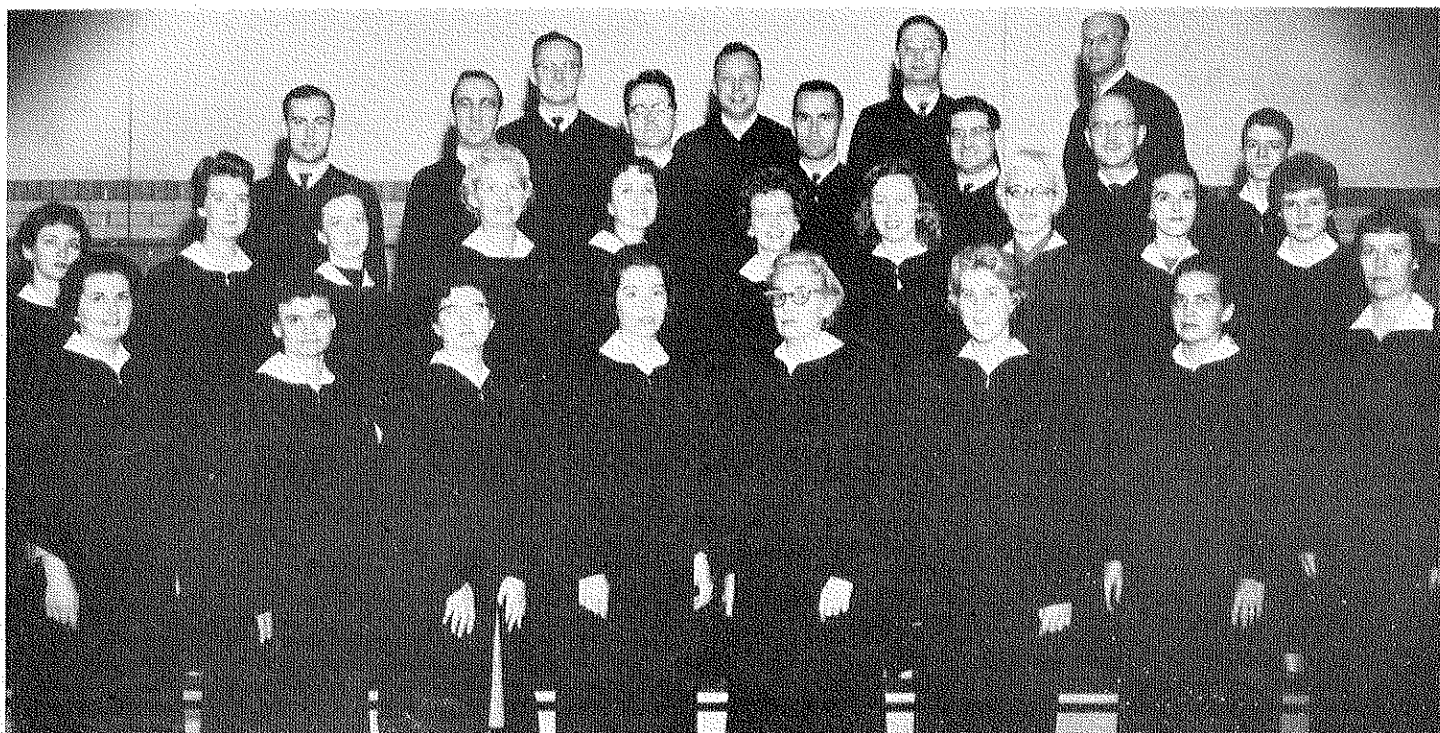

## LET'S FACE UP TO THE FACTS!

Recently, many communities throughout the United States celebrated National Education Week. Some interesting questions which are important to all of us were developed during the celebrations. For example, what does education mean to a child? How can parents work for better schools? What is a Teacher? What are the responsibilities of school board members? How can the schools serve adult citizens? How does the voter make his decisions on education?

There was a time when education's achievements and problems occupied the center-stage of public interest only during American Education Week. As soon as the observance was over, citizens tended to forget that informed first-hand concern for the schools should be a year-round proposition.

This is no longer true. Public interest in schools continues constant throughout the year, it runs deeper and stronger than ever before.

Today, when education is acknowledged to be the front line of our country's security, important to our continued economic welfare, and basic to our social growth, it is vital that all of us know exactly what's going on in the school. What are the things to look for? We should ask ourselves: Are the classes small enough so that the student is getting his fair share of the teacher's attention? Is the school large enough so that it not only gives a good general education to all the students, but has sufficient facilities and a large enough teaching staff to challenge the very bright children? Are the teachers' salaries adequate and in line with the training required by the profession?

A Census Bureau report reveals that those who finish elementary school may earn \$116,000 in their lifetime; high school graduates may earn \$165,000; college graduates \$268,000. Make sure that students in your community are receiving the best possible education. A good education will be of benefit to the student and your community.

Remember: A boy or girl's future depends to a large extent on the caliber of the schools in the community where he or she lives. The key to good schools in your community is in the hands of its residents.

A campaign team of approximately 600 workers canvassed residential areas in Portsmouth and Scioto County November 16, in quest of funds for the Happy Hearts School.

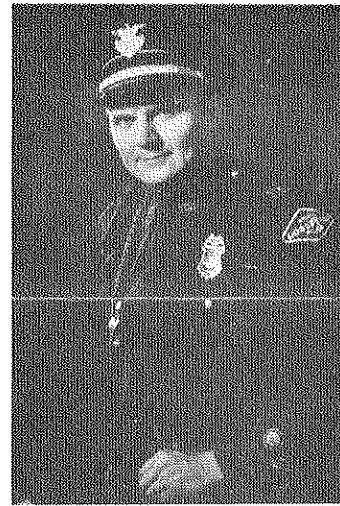

## This Employee Combines Practice And Desire To Develop Into One Of GAT's Top Bowlers

Don Jessee, process area 1, is an excellent example of an individual who strives for success in a recreational activity. If you stop in at any area bowling alley the chances are that you will see Don either practicing or bowling in league competition.

Don took up bowling four years ago. The "bowling bug" really bit him and ever since he has been a dedicated bowler. Last year he bowled in seven different leagues and he developed into one of the top bowlers at GAT. This year he is bowling in only three leagues — the Wednesday Night League of Waverly, the Portsmouth "C" Shift League, and the Portsmouth Thursday Night League. His high single game, to date, is 279 rolled in the Portsmouth "C" Shift League. He finished the series with a 626.

Currently, Don is averaging 182, 183, and 192. This is excellent bowling in any language.

How do you judge a successful bowler? Here are some of his bowling accomplishments of the last four years. He won the doubles championship in the Chillicothe City Association Tournament held at Chillicothe in 1957. His team was scratch team champions in the same tournament at Waverly last year. He has been a member of a winning team in the annual GAT Shift Tournament. He and his partner placed third in the GAT Doubles Tournament three years ago. His team is a two-time champion of the "C" Shift League of Waverly.

His bowling style resembles some-

what that of Don Carter. We asked him if he developed the style by observing Carter on TV. "No," he answered, "when I began to bowl I read a lot of books and magazines written by 'experts' on the proper approach, stance, manner of holding the ball, type of equipment, etc. Most of the top bowlers were of the same opinion . . . don't copy anyone's style . . . just be natural. This I have tried to do."

This bowling philosophy has paid off as evidenced by his past accomplishments and current averages. Don is probably about as relaxed and amiable as any bowler in any of the GAT leagues.
