Clyde Jenkins To Retire; Completes 42 Years Service

The leadership of veteran Clyde Jenkins, manager, purchasing and materials was lost Jan. 16, when he completed his last day of work prior to retirement March 31.

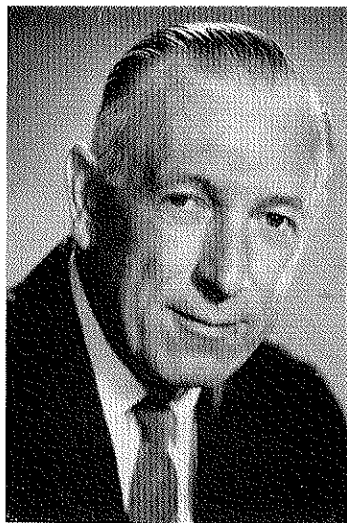
During his 42 years with GT&R, Clyde was called upon to serve in a variety of capacities. He first joined Goodyear, Akron in 1928, as a production control foreman. In 1937 he was assigned to Goodyear's Jackson, Michigan Plant as manager of purchasing and materials. Goodyear Aerospace-Akron called for Jenkins' services in 1942 when WW II contracts caused a large increase in production. As Manager of Production Control at GAC, Clyde was responsible for the production scheduling of Corsair fighter planes.

In 1945, as the war drew to a close, Jenkins was transferred to the Goodyear Sao Paulo, Brazil Plant as manager of purchasing and materials. Returning to the United States in 1948 he was named as

manager of production control, merchandising, shipping and traffic at Gadsden, Alabama.

Clyde came to Goodyear Atomic in 1953 as a member of the original 28-man management start-up team. His first assignment was superintendent of materials and service. In March 1958 he was promoted to the position of manager of purchasing and materials.

Clyde is an active member of the Jackson Michigan Masonic Lodge #50 F&AM, GAT Silver Compass Club, National Association of Purchasing Agents, Chillicothe Chamber of Commerce, Chillicothe Country Club and United Church of Chillicothe.

He and Mrs. (Helen) Jenkins reside at 530 Arch Street in Chillicothe. They have a son, John, a pilot with United Airlines in Crystal Lakes, Illinois.

Directors of The Goodyear Tire & Rubber Company recently declared a regular quarterly dividend of 2 1/4 cents a share on the common stock, payable March 16 to stockholders of record Feb. 16.

Blood Program Bolstered

Generous response to the appeal for blood donors was once again evident on January 12 and 13, when 210 employees responded and guaranteed an adequate supply of replacement blood for Goodyearites and their families.

An excellent first day's showing of 117 pints was followed by the collection of 93 pints on the second day.

Shift workers on 4-12 and 12-8 shifts maintained their usual generous response by contributing 28 pints. OVEC and AEC were also well represented.

To the 228 employees signing up to give the 210 pint total goes a sincere thank you. This is the highest total since January 1967, when 240 pints were collected.

To avoid confusion employees are once again reminded: (1) Every GAT employe is automatically a member of the blood program and (2) the program includes complete coverage of the employe, his immediate family, parents, parents-in-law, and all GAT retired employes and their spouses.

Merit Scholarship Test Date Set

Employes' children interested in qualifying for the Goodyear Merit Scholarship Program are reminded that now is the time to check with their school advisors or principals about taking the necessary examinations.

The National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test for the 1971-72 awards will be administered on Saturday, Feb. 14, 1970 or, at the option of the principal, on Tuesday, Feb. 17.

Announcement of the test dates was made by O. D. Taliaferro, manager of salaried personnel.

Any child of a full-time employe of Goodyear or a subsidiary with two or more years of continuous service may compete for the scholarships. Children of retired or deceased employes who had two or more years of service also are eligible.

Students planning to enter college in 1971 are to take the qualifying test next month. At the time they take the test, most will be second semester juniors or first semester seniors in high school.

Those who score high on the qualifying test will become semi-finalists in the scholarship competition. Announcement of semi-finalists will be made in the fall of 1970.

In November 1970, the semi-finalists will be required by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation to take the scholastic aptitude test of the College Entrance Examination Board. On the basis of this second test, finalists will be selected by NMSC and will be notified in February or March of 1971.

Winners will be selected from the finalists by an im-

partial committee of educators. Factors considered by the NMSC committee include test scores, high school grades, character, qualities of leadership and citizenship, work habits, and general range of interests. Names of the winners will be announced in the spring of 1971. Under the current program, 15 scholarships will be awarded.

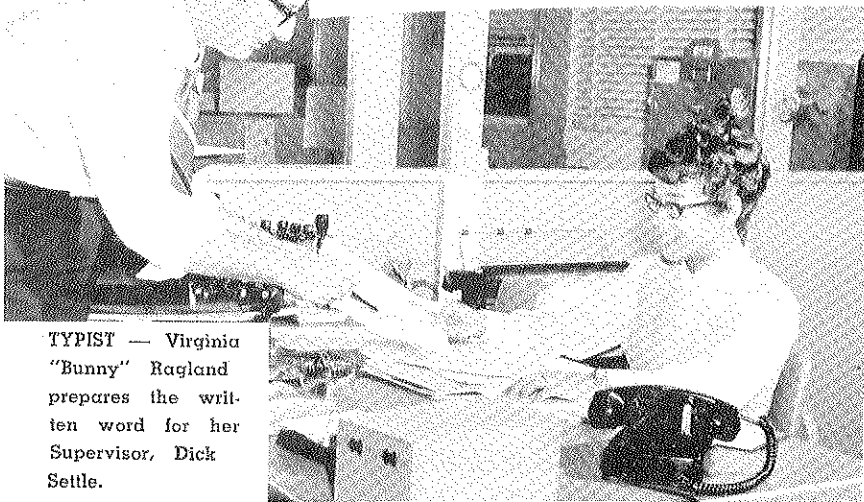
"Unfortunately," Taliaferro said, "it is too late for students to qualify for scholarships to be awarded in 1970. Candidates for these scholarships took the qualifying tests early in 1969 and semi-finalists already have been selected."

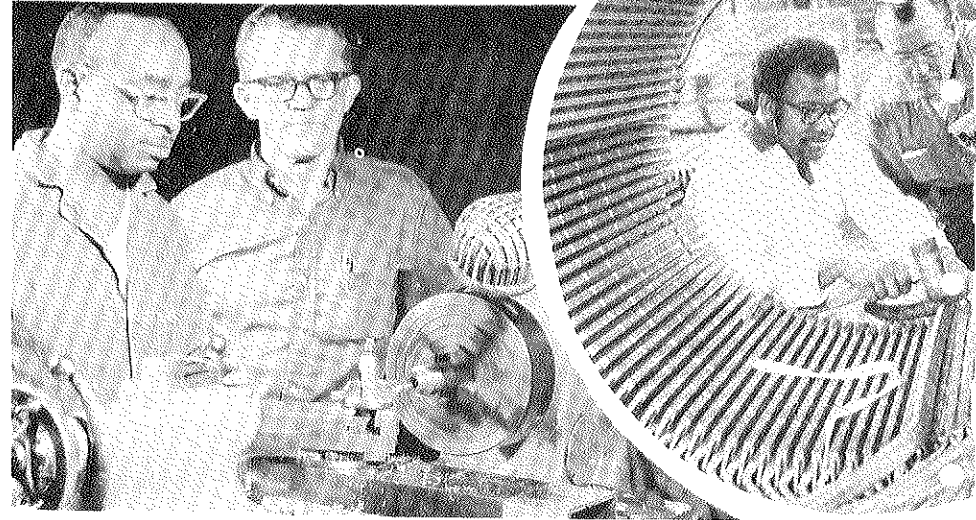

Jim Grant (l) reviews qualifications with Ad Squad member Dick Lowe.



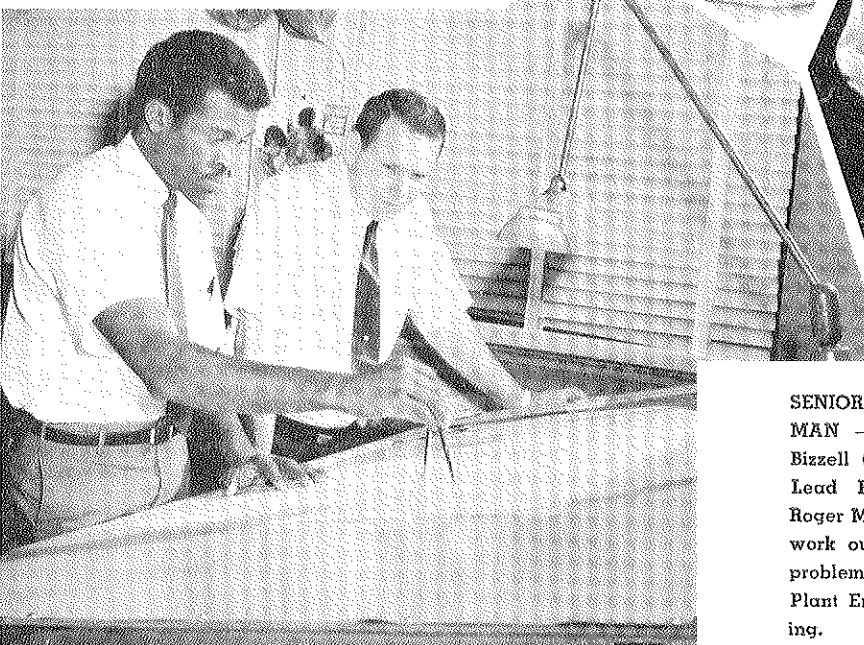
TYPIST — Virginia "Bunny" Ragland prepares the written word for her Supervisor, Dick Settle.



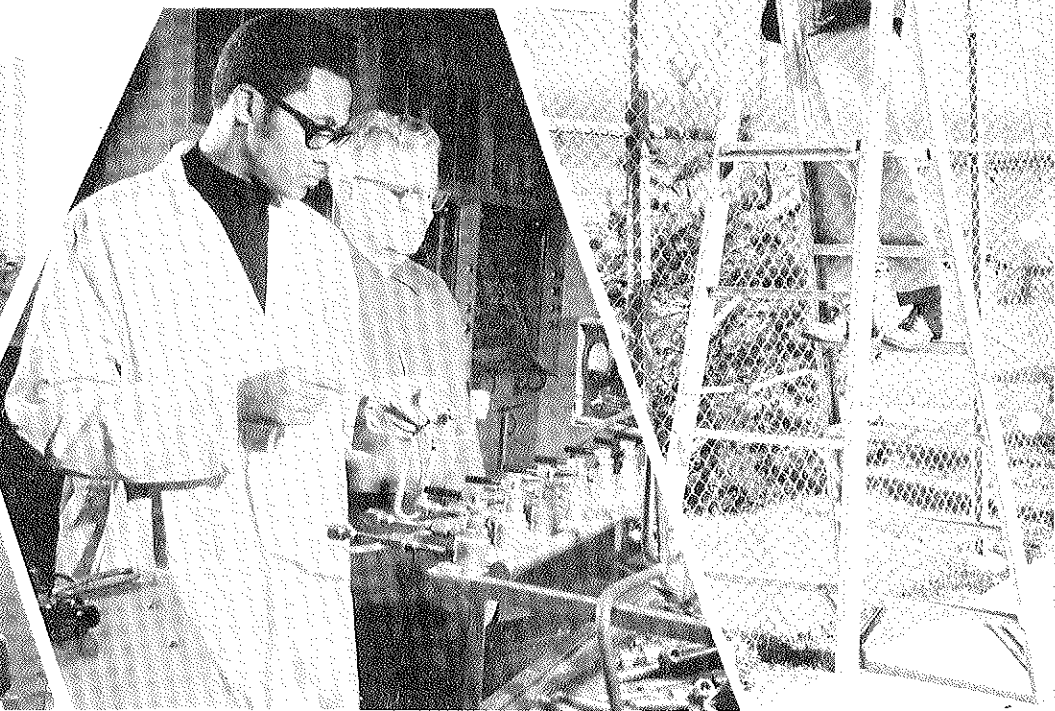

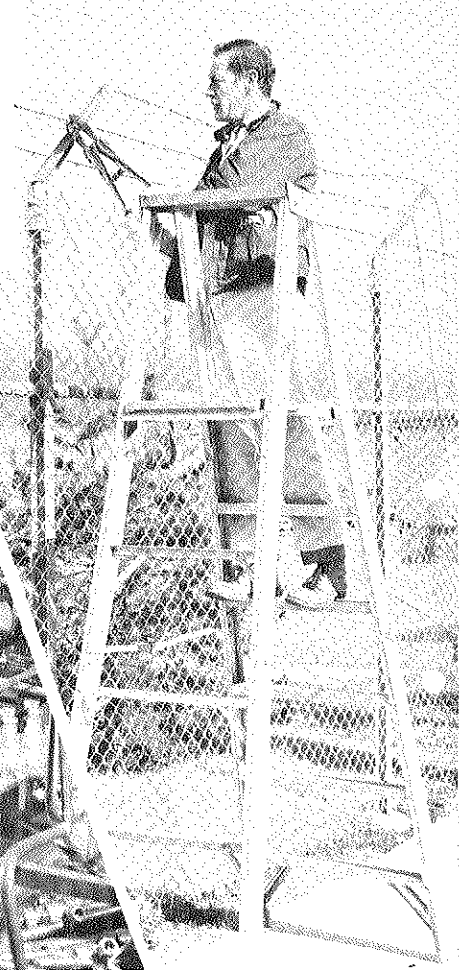
TRAINEE — Shirley Trent is guided by the instruction of technical illustrator, Bill Justice.

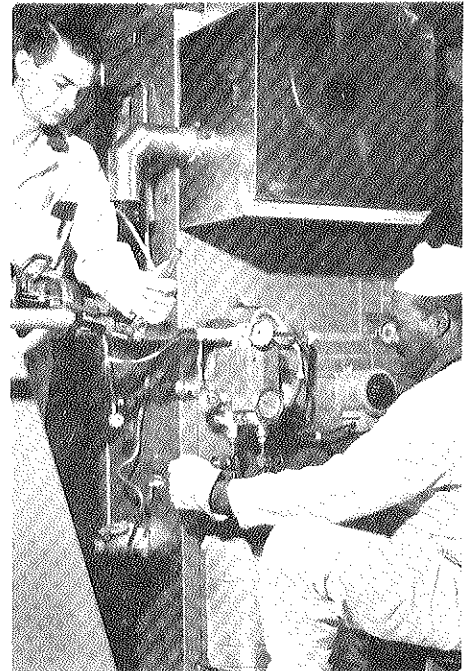

Remember in the final analysis — GOODYEAR IS PEOPLE — people of all backgrounds and origins — working together to achieve common goals.

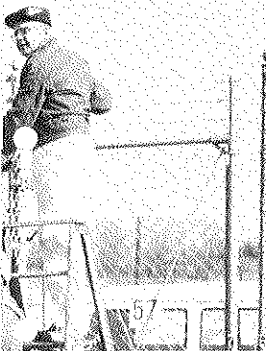
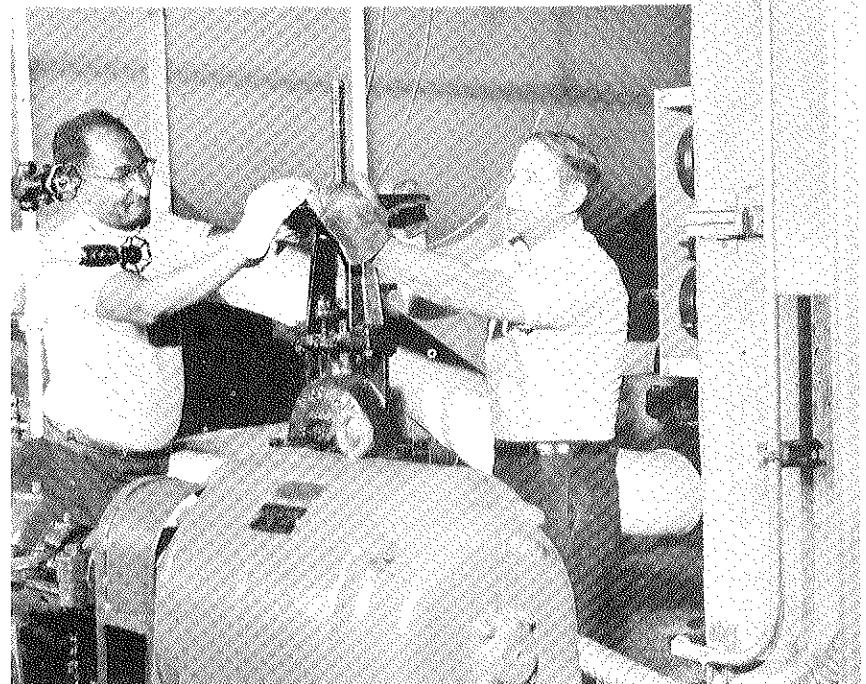


SS MATERIALS HANDLERS — Alto Byrd (r) and Jesse Franklin are responsible for sampling UF₆ cylinders prior to shipment.

ADMINISTRATIVE SQUADRON — Squad member Bernard Harris gets "clued in" on plant safety standards from Frank Buckalew.

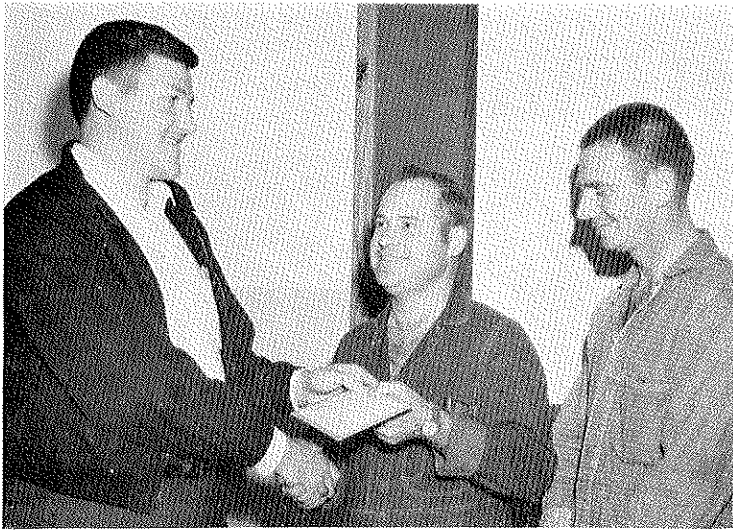


Zigler Completes 35 Years Service

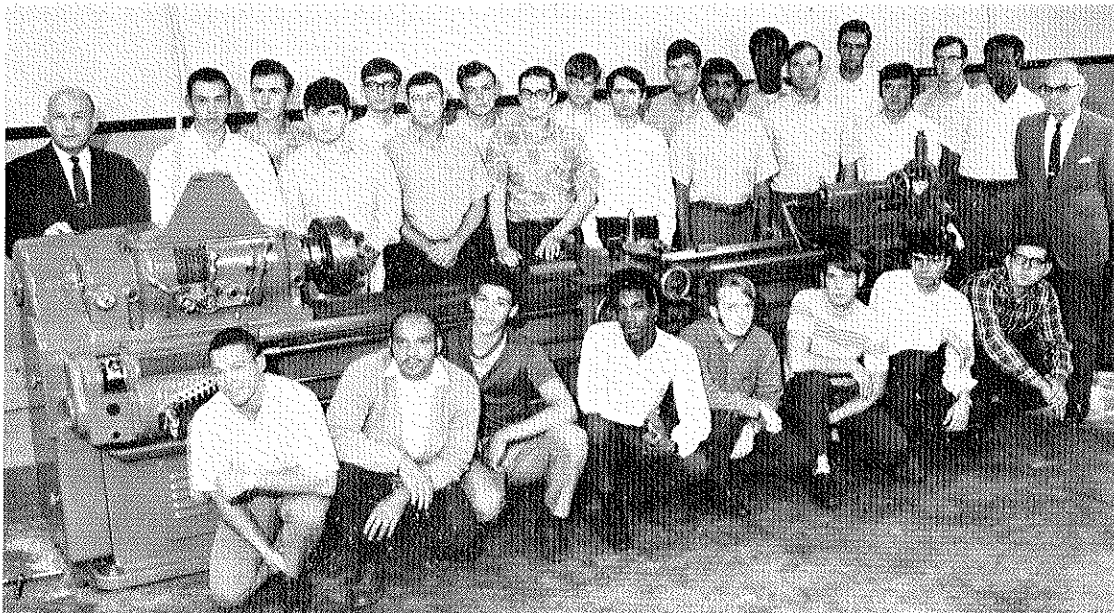
Jim Hamilton, also a junior, is a forward in his first year with the team. Jim, a transferee from Rio Grande College is noted for his stellar defensive ability.
