For those interested in statistics — the final tabulation revealed 91 percent of our employes made contributions. Sixty-three departments came up with 100 percent participation and 71 exceeded the 90% mark.

The Finance Division was highest with 99% participation. Engineering and Maintenance Division reached the highest dollar total with \$7,174 and the division with the highest per employe average was Industrial Relations Division with a \$28 per employe average.

The final contribution of fund to the four county area revealed Jackson — \$3,133; Pike — \$9,542; Ross — \$7,140; Scioto — \$12,677. Contributions designated for United Fund other than the four-county area were forwarded to the particular United Fund organization.

This is the first time we at GAT have had an AIO goal. We not only met our \$20,700 goal but went over the top by \$800.

## Goodyear Third-Quarter Sales Reach New High

The highest third-quarter sales and earnings in history were achieved by Goodyear during the three months ending September 30, Russell DeYoung, chairman and chief executive officer, and Victor Holt, Jr., president, have announced.

Sales and earnings for the first nine months of 1971 were at an all-time high, they reported.

For the July-September period this year, sales totaled \$901,384,000. This was a gain of 13.9 percent over the \$791,064,000 reported a year ago, and was 12.2 percent more than the previous third quarter record of \$803,313,000 established in 1969.

Third quarter net income was \$41,072,000, equivalent to 56 cents a share, and was an increase of 16.3 percent over the net of \$35,317,000 or 49 cents a share, reported a year ago. It also was 2.5 percent above the previous third quarter record of \$40,063,000, or 55

cents a share, established in 1969.

Goodyear's nine-month sales were a record \$2,664,872,000 this year, the two executives revealed. This was 12.1 percent greater than last year's nine-month sales of \$2,377,658,000 and was 11.7 percent greater than was recorded in the first nine months of 1969, when sales hit \$2,386,499,000.

Net income for the nine months just ended was \$121,439,000, equivalent to \$1.67 a share. It exceeded by 32.1 percent the 1970 nine-month net of \$91,938,000, or \$1.27 a share.

And it was 4.4 percent above the previous nine-month record of \$116,310,000 or \$1.61 a share, set in 1961.

Goodyear's current sales and earnings figures represent a recovery from the strike-plagued operations of 1970, the two executives noted. The increases reflect overall improvement in the nation's economy and in the company's position in its various markets.

Barring an unexpected downturn in the economy, Goodyear should continue its growth in the fourth quarter, they predicted.

Present and past members of the committee board heard General Manager, C. D. Tabor express his appreciation for their valuable contribution to GAT's outstanding safety record.

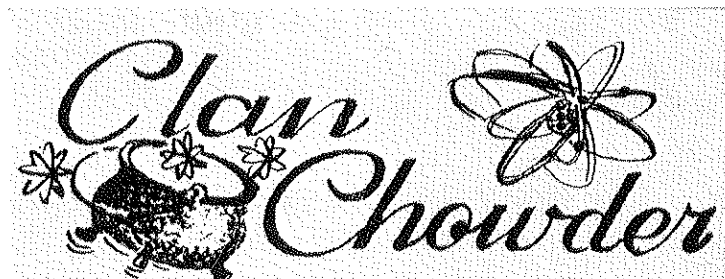
Originating in 1957, the committee was organized to review safety questions relating to the safety of GAT employees.

The committee, composed of members of supervision and union members, has reviewed some 411 problems directly relating to the safety of our plant.

Some of the actions taken by the committee have resulted in construction of guard rails, safety guards on rotating parts, fabrication of safety work platforms, erection of safety signs and designing of special jigs, shields and other safety devices.

## Top Year Predicted For Nuclear Power

Recent articles appearing in national nuclear publications indicate 1971 and 1972 may be banner years for nuclear orders. Articles indicate U. S. nuclear power orders may hit a record total this year of 29-30,000 Mw of capacity. And 1972 may be just as good or better. With several months to go in 1971, light-water-reactor vendors are predicting that some 16-17,000 Mw of nuclear capacity will be ordered on top of the 13,000 Mw already ordered this year. If so, 1971 orders will exceed 1967's record of 27,000 Mw; will almost double last year's orders; and

will be almost quadruple 1969's.

The surprising surge in orders and prospective orders (most predictions for 1971 had ranged between 17,000 and 25,000 Mw) has developed, informed sources say, because the uncertainties over fuel supply and environmental controls on fossil-fueled plants are even bigger than the uncertainties over the licensing of nuclear plants. There is also an important element of forward ordering in the picture, as the utilities respond to various sorts of delays by extending their ordering lead-times into 1979, 1980 and 1981.

## Wide Variety Offered In Educational Assistance

Goodyear Atomic's Educational Assistance Program has just entered another year of helping employes upgrade themselves and their job performance.

Under this program, GAT invests money for tuition and employes invest their time. Last year some 83 employes were enrolled in courses at a total expenditure of over \$16,000. Tuition aid is available for non-degree undergraduate and graduate credit. Non-degree work must be related to the employe's present job assignment.

Those wishing to enroll in the undergraduate study program must have satisfactorily completed at least 60 semester hours or 90 quarter hours in an accredited college or university.

A number of GAT employes have taken and are taking advantage of the Educational Assistance Program to earn Bachelor and/or Master degrees.

### High School Degree Offered

GAT employes who do not have a high school diploma can now take advantage of the latest educational assistance innovation being offered by the Training Department.

In cooperation with the Adult Basic Laboratory in Piketon, programmed instruction courses are being offered to ALL employes interested

in obtaining a high school equivalency certificate.

The program is being conducted on plantsite every Monday and Wednesday.
