

America Must Support The Free Enterprise System

Chairman Charles J. Pilliod, Jr. has urged a group of education leaders to take the initiative in building public understanding of the free enterprise system and mending America's social and economic fabric.

Pilliod said the nations' colleges and universities represent the best hope to counteract forces "that threaten to render free enterprise impotent and also are undermining the freedoms of the education system."

Pilliod was the keynote speaker at the first National Conference of University and Business Leaders,

held at Kent State University in Kent, Ohio, near Akron. He told the group that business and other American institutions are being hamstrung by "a combination of economic ignorance and a deliberate effort by some groups to subvert free enterprise and replace it first with collectivism and eventually regimentation of our whole society."

Ignorance of economics, he said, has led to an "ever-increasing flood" of regulations, restrictions and taxes that are hobbling the nation's ability to generate the \$4-trillion in private

investment and nearly 20-million new jobs that will be needed by 1985.

He cited these examples:

- A legislative proposal to permit triple damages to be established in antitrust cases on the basis of population polls without having to prove even one individual claim of damage;

- Proposals to break up the nation's 20 largest oil companies on the basis of their size and without regard for what this would mean to America's quest for more energy sources;

- A tire quality grading system that would cost consumers \$150-million a year for the "dubious assistance" of having 180 decisions to make with every tire purchase;

- Proposals to double tax the foreign earnings of American multinational companies and render them incapable of competing effectively abroad, while ignoring government studies showing such foreign operations are responsible for between 500,000 and 600,000 American jobs that otherwise would not exist.

Jefferson Writes The Draft

On June 10th of 1776, Congress voted to postpone for three weeks the consideration of Richard Henry Lee's resolution calling for a declaration of independence. A committee consisting of Thomas Jefferson, Benjamin Franklin, John Adams, Robert Livingston and Roger Sherman was named to prepare a draft. But the actual writing in spite of his protests, went to the 33-year-old Jefferson, John Adams put it bluntly:

"Reason first—You are a Virginian, and a Virginian ought to appear at the head of this business. Reason second — I am obnoxious, suspected and unpopular. You are very much otherwise. Reason third—You can write ten times better than I can."

Very little is known about the actual writing of the Declaration. We do know that Jefferson wrote it in two weeks, that he "turned neither to book nor pamphlet" but drew upon his knowledge of political philosophy. According to Jefferson, he was not interested in setting forth "new principles" or "new arguments," but rather in placing before mankind the common sense of the subject.

The result of his labors was a combination of skillful propaganda and solid political reasoning that justified the right to revolution, based on the principle that government ultimately rests upon the consent of the governed.

tion. The fall quarter is tentatively scheduled to include 'Introduction to Business' and a repeat of the Psychology course.

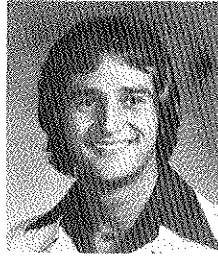

Energy Facts

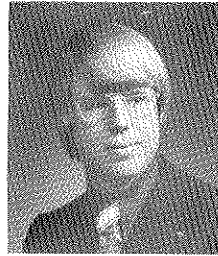
Our energy consumption grew at a rate of 4.5% per year from 1965-1973. In 1974 it declined 2.2% and our average income also declined.

We were self-sufficient in energy through 1950, but the situation has deteriorated since then. Dependence on foreign oil grew to 35% of petroleum consumption in 1973. In spite of all efforts at conservation, it was still 35% in 1975.

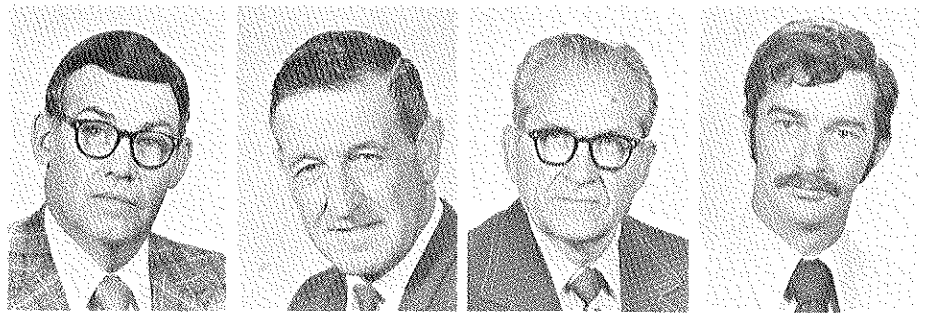
NAPM Certificate Achieved By Watts

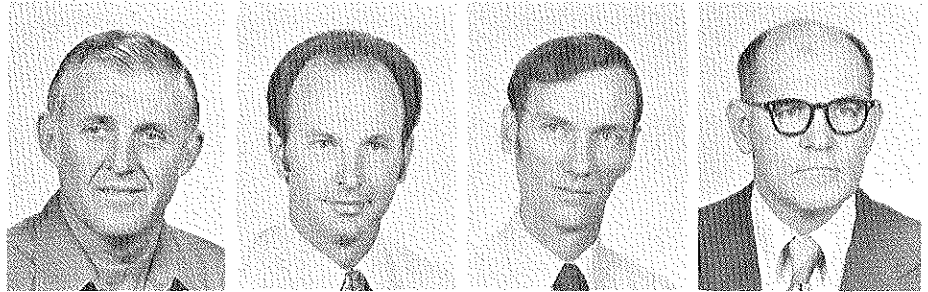
