# State & Federal officials urge centrifuge plant in Ohio

On Saturday, April 23, 1977, approximately 1000 people packed the American Legion Hall in Portsmouth voicing their con-cern as to the location of the proposed centrifuge uranium enrichment plant. When the meeting ended several hours later, there was little doubt left as to what the feeling was in the Tri-State area.

The meeting was arranged by Vernal Riffe, Speaker of the House of Representatives in Ohio. and John Glenn, U.S. Senator from Ohio. Most facets of the community, from industrialists and labor to welfare recipients and the ministry, were represented

Speaker Riffe, acting as master of ceremonies, "felt that a definite committment was made to the community and it is expected to be carried out." Senator Glenn remarked that "the indecision on relocation of the expansion caused concern, suspicion and distrust."

Representative William Harsha. who worked long and hard for the gaseous diffusion add-on plant project, summed up his feelings by saying, 'I am going to wage my own campaign to make it untenable for the President to take our project away from us. Governor Rhodes expressed "a declaration of war on Tennessee"

over the issue. Robert Fri, Acting Administrator of ERDA, indicated that a decision should be forthcoming within three weeks. He candidly said, "I was sent here to get a message and take it back. I think I got the message. I can guarantee I'll take it back."

When asked about the dif-ference between the diffusion and centrifuge process, he felt that it should result in lower costs to uranium enrichment customers and will cut electrical power requirements by more than 90 per cent. A key point he did make was that "it takes a few less people to build the plant over the four or five years it gets built. But in the 30-year operating life of the plant, it means 1,500 more permanent workers to run a centrifuge plant than it would a diffusion plant."

At the meeting also, were labor leaders such as Milan Marsh, President of the Ohio AFL-CIO. plus state and local representatives from other crafts. Other meeting attendees pointed to the moral issue of the President keeping his committment of last November during the Presidential Campaign.

It was apparent what the feeling was when the meeting was adjourned after several hours on Saturday afternoon, April 23, 1977. Hopefully by presstime of the May Clan, the suspense and indecision will be over.

#### 1,500 to 1,800 attend

### Rally for centrifuge plant also held in Oak Ridge

On Saturday, April 30, a rally was also held in Oak Ridge, Tenn. regarding the location of the proposed gas centrifuge plant fa-

It was estimated that approximately 1500 to 1800 people attended the rally. Featured speakers were Howard Baker and James Sasser, Senators from Tenn., Marilyn Lloyd, Representative, Governor Ray Blanton, plus numerous State and local officials.

Naturally those in attendance felt the proposed centrifuge facility should be located in Oak Ridge. The main crux of thier argument revolved around the fact that the Centrifuge Pilot Plant has been in Oak Ridge for over a decade. It also was reported that the Tennessee Senators and Representatives hope to meet with President Carter before the centrifuge plant location decision is made. It also was felt by several speakers at the Rally that locating the centrifuge facility there would compensate the State for the loss of the Clinch River fast breeder project.







# GT&R records record first quarter in 1977

Record first quarter earnings rose 35 percent over the same period a year ago as sales reached an all-time high for any guarter in Goodyear's history, Board Chairman, Charles J. Pil-liod Jr., reported.

Sales reached \$1,577,300,000, exceeding by nearly 124 million dollars, or 8.5 percent, the \$1,453,600,000 in sales in the first three months of 1976. The previous quarterly sales high was the \$1,527,300,000 in the fourth quarter of 1976, making two record quarters back to back.

Goodyear's net income was 59 million dollars, equivalent to 82 cents a share compared with 43.7 million, or 60 cents a share earned in the first quarter of 1976. The earnings in the first quarter of 1977 were equivalent to 3.7 cents on each dollar of sales, compared with 3 cents in the first quarter of 1976.


