



On Monday, November 21, The Valley Canteen Corporation served 1175 customers for lunch, a 25-year record. A big tip of the hat to Jean Golden and her staff who served the delicious, "all-you-can eat" buffet and set the consumption record.





In the three plants, 6,100,000 kilowatts of electrical energy is used to power electric motors which drive compressors to circulate the



uranium in the form of a gas. Almost 90% of this total energy, or over 5,000,000 kilowatts is converted to heat generated by the compression of the process gas, then transferred to a circulating water system and then dissipated to the atmosphere. It is estimated that using a good portion of this heat could result in a savings of at least 40,000 barrels of oil equivalent per day by 1985.

Principal objective of the studies is to cover a complete range of possible applications including electrical generation, use in process in-dustries, and use for residential, industrial and commercial heating and cooling purposes.



# Zigler Captures 77 GAT Spirit Award

Maurice R. Zigler, whose career with Goodyear has spanned over 43 years, is the recipient of the 1977 GAT Spirit Award. The award is for the GAT employe who most projects the Goodyear Spirit through job performance as well as

community activities.

Zigler began his career with Goodyear in Akron in 1934 as an hourly employe. Subsequently, while there he was promoted to Shift Foreman, Secretary to Russell DeYoung, and Supervisor in the Storekeeping area.

He transferred to Goodyear Atomic in 1953 as Supervisor, Stores. In 1958 he was named Superintendent, Materials and Service, and assumed his present position in April 1970.
"Mr. Zigler has also found time

to be active in his community, es-

pecially through his work in the Orchard Hill United Church of Christ in Ross County," reports the employe who nominated him. "He helped organize the church in the early 1950's and has served in many capacities such as moderator, secretary, and Chairman of the Board of Deacons."

At GAT, "Zig" as he is known to many co-workers, handles many of the GAT budget projects for sub-mission to DOE, projects which "must be precise and complete."

# Football Star Rich Wingo Linebacker For The Crimson Tide Of Alabama

The University of Alabama is again ranked in the top ten teams in the nation this year and sports a 9-1 win-loss record. Coached by the legendary Bear Bryant, they feature one of the nation's strongest defensive teams, and one of the top defensive players is Rich Wingo, son of Joseph and Norma Wingo, an Engineer and a Nurse at GAT, respectively

Rich was an All-State player in Indiana in 1973. "He was recruited heavily by Notre Dame, but that was only fifteen miles away and he wanted to go to school a greater distance away," recollected his father. "Although it is reported that Alabama has the most severe and intense practice schedule, Rich has never regretted his decision to play there. They have already been on television three times this year and Rich has watches from playing in the Liberty Bowl and the Orange Bowl during his freshman and

sophomore years.

Rich is the starting strongside linebacker for Sugar Bowl-bound Alabama. He is the Crimson Tide's second leading tackler this year, having made 68 tackles. Five of his tackles have been quarterback sacks and he also caused and recovered a fumble.

As a sophomore he had 44 tackles and was awarded the LeeRoy Jordan Headhunter Award, named after the former Alabama and Dallas Cowboys' great, and the No. 1 award for spring performance.

"Yes, Bear Bryant is rough," Rich was quoted as saying. "But

he is thorough and his teams always are in great physical shape. He coaches practices from a high platform and will stop a practice completely and tell a player to leave and hit the showers. Believe me that is a frightening feeling and really keeps every player going 100%. I know because I took an early shower once and I never want to again." Rich is coached by Paul Crane, himself a former All-American linebacker and a member of the New York Jets Super Bowl championship team.



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
