Retirement Law Is Changed

Earlier in 1978, Congress passed a new law changing the permissible mandatory retirement age from 65 to

Since that time, a number of employes have raised questions about the effect of this law and other benefits plans since the mandatory retirement age has been 65. Under the new law, the age 70 limitation will become effective on January 1,



1979, for employes not subject to a collective bargaining agreement. In other words, employes who attain age 65 in January, 1979, or later will have their mandatory retirement age increased from 65 to 70.

The Department of Labor has not issued final regulations. As a result, the implication of the law and its effect has not yet been determined. The new law does not require, though, an employer to count years of service after an employe has reached "normal retirement age" for the purpose of pension benefits. Goodyear Atomic will continue to consider age 65 as the normal retirement age for Goodyear employes.

Hourly employes covered under the current OCAW Local 3-689 contract are not subject to the age 70 limitation until the current agreement expires next May 2.

Listen, my son

"I am saying this to you as you lie asleep, one little hand clutching your pillow. I have stolen into your room alone.

"Just a few minutes ago, as I sat reading my paper in the living room, a wave of remorse swept over me. Guiltily, I came to your bedside.

"These are the things I was thinking, son: I had been cross to you. I scolded you as you were dressing for school because you gave your face merely a dab with a towel. I took you to task for not cleaning your shoes.

"I called out angrily when I found you had thrown some of your things on the floor and at breakfast I found fault, too. You spilled things. You gulped down your food, spread butter too thick on your bread.

"And, as you started off to school, and I started for work, you turned and waved a little hand and called, 'Goodbye, Daddy!' and I frowned and said in reply, 'Hold your shoulders back.

"Then it began all over again in the late afternoon. As I came up the hill, I spied you down on your knees playing marbles. There were holes in your socks and I humiliated you before your boy friends by making you march ahead of me back to the house. Socks were expensive — and if you had to buy them you would be more careful! Imagine that, Son, from a father! It was such stupid, silly logic.

"Do you remember, later, when I was reading in the living room, how you came in, softly, timidly, with a sort of hurt look in your eyes? When I glanced up over my paper, impatient at the interruption, you hesitated at the door. 'What is it you want?' I snapped.

"You said nothing, but ran across, in one tempestuous plunge, and threw your arms around my neck and kissed me, again and again, and your small arms tightened with an affection that God has set blooming in your heart and which even neglect could not wither. And then you were gone, pattering up the stairs.


"Well, son, it was shortly afterwards that my paper slipped from my hands and a terrible sickening fear came over me. Suddenly I saw myself as I really was, in all my horrible roughness and I felt sick at heart.

"What has habit been doing to me? The habit of complaining, of finding fault, or reprimanding — all of these were my rewards to you for being a boy. It was not that I didn't love you; it was that I expected so much of youth, I was measuring you by the yardstick of my own years.

"And there was so much that was good and fine and true in your character. You did not deserve my treatment of you, Son. The little heart of you was as big as the dawn over the

"All this was shown by your spontaneous impulse to rush in and kiss me good-night. Nothing else matters tonight. I have come to your bedside in the darkness, and I have knelt there, choking with emotion, and so ashamed!

"It is a feeble atonement. I know you would not understand these things if I told them to you during your waking hours, yet I must say what I am saying.



"And I have prayed God to strengthen me in my new resolve. Tomorrow I will be a real daddy! I will chum with you and suffer when you suffer and laugh when you laugh. I will bite my tongue when impatient words come. I will keep saying as if it were a ritual: 'He is nothing but a boy — a little boy!'

"I am afraid I have visualized you as a man. Yet as I see you now, Son, crumpled and weary in your bed, I see that you are still a baby. Yesterday you were in your mother's arms, your head on her shoulder. I have asked too much, too soon.

"I do not know of a better shrine before which a father or mother may kneel or stand than that of a sleeping child. I don't know of a holier place, a temple where one is more likely to come into closer touch with all that is infinitely good, where one may come nearer to see and feeling God. From that shrine comes love and laughter, trust and cheer to bless the new day. And before that shrine should fall our soft vespers, our grateful benedictions for the night.

"At the bed of a sleeping babe all man-made ranks and inequalities are ironed out, and all mankind kneels reverently before the living image of the Creator.

New Law Considers Pregnancy a Disability

Under a new law, Goodyear Atomic as well as other employers, will now be required to include pregnancy among the list of ailments for which an employe receives disability benefits.

The new law amends the 1964 Civil Rights Act and was passed in the wake of a Supreme Court decision holding that different benefits for pregnancy are not sex-based discrimination despite the fact that only women can become pregnant. The court ruled that General Electric's

exclusion of pregnant employes from its disability benefit program did not constitute sex discrimination.

The company is studying the effect of the law, signed November 1 by President Carter, on its benefits plan for hourly and salaried employes. The law requires that employers bring their plans into compliance by May 1, 1979.

Under the existing plans the company pays sick leave benefits for up to six weeks due to pregnancy.
