
Wendell E. Woodruff, Jackson, March 1. An employee since 1977, Woodruff was a police officer.

Probes use nuclear power

Three nuclear generators are powering the instruments and cameras which sent back to earth photographs and extensive data of the planet Jupiter.

The 155-watt radioisotope thermoelectric generators are on board the Voyager I spacecraft which has made the closest approach yet to the solar system's largest planet.

The spacecraft also has 23 onewatt thermal radioisotope heater units to maintain instruments at desired operating temperatures during the craft's flight past Jupiter, on

Only four months behind is Voyager II, an identical spacecraft with three nuclear generators which is scheduled for a close encounter with Jupiter on July 9, and then to move on to Saturn and possibly Uranus and Neptune. The spacecraft will continue into outer space without returning to earth.

Programs offer opportunities for savings



The Atomic Employees' Credit Union is a "cooperative" bank in which members can save at equitable interest rates through the convenience of payroll deduction. Savings are pooled and then loaned to other members. New Goodyear Atomic employees signing up for

membership in the Credit Union are Malissa I. Scherer (D 241), Starlene C. Brooks (D-542) and Patrick R. LaRosa (D-232). Credit Union employees behind the counter are Raye N. Thoms and Nancy S. Kerrison.

Summer safety: Home awareness is important

A home is one's castle. It's also the place where a majority of incidents occur during summer and result in death or serious injury.

Considering the countless slashes, gashes, bumps, breaks, sprains, pains and aches that originate in the course of "around-the-house" activities, this cannot be disputed.

Home accidents have far-reaching effects. The most obvious is the pain and suffering for a Goodyearite or family member. Then there are the problems of medical treatment and time lost from work.

As you engage in work projects or leisure activities around home this summer, be attentive toward preventing "unusual" accidents.

One of the more frequent sources of summer pain and injury is the power lawn mower. Everyone should respect the power mower and observe the following precautions relative to its operation:

(1) Learn the rules in the manufacturer's manual and pay particular attention to learning how to disengage the clutch or stop the motor quickly in case of emergency.



Use safety gear when mowing!

The toe you mow ... Never use a power lawn mower barefoot or with open sandals. The wisest option in mowing apparel is a pair of safety shoes to protect your feet. The power lawn mower is a cause of many home accidents each summer—accidents which could be prevented with a little common sense.



(3) Wear safety shoes or toe guards. Wear safety goggles to protect your eyes from flying materials.

(4) Keep children and pets out of the yard to avoid the possibility of injury from objects thrown by the whirling blades. Do not allow children to operate the machine—it is not a toy.

(5) Make sure of your footing. Never pull the mower toward you on an incline.

(6) Store fuel in an approved metal safety container in a well-ventilated area. Do not refuel the power mower when the motor is hot or still running.

(7) Stop the engine whenever you leave the machine.


(8) Disconnect the spark plug wire before cleaning the underside of the mower.

(9) Have the mower inspected periodically and kept in good repair by a qualified serviceman.

Following these suggestions should help insure safe power mower operation during the summer mowing season

Accidental poisoning is a hazard which accounts for a substantial number of home fatalities during summer months. Empty soda pop bottles or food jars should not be used as storage containers for leftover pesticides. These bottles invite youngsters to taste the contents, as they think the materials might be something to eat or drink.

Your charcoal grill is potentially lethal. Burning charcoal gives off carbon monoxide, a deadly substance. A



charcoal grill used inside a closed garage could be dangerous.

There now are frequent reports of glass door accidents, in which both youngsters and adults have walked, stumbled or run into and through plate glass doors. The installation of safety glass with decal decorations is recommended for all glass door locations.

Home handymen seem especially prone to accidents which include sprains from tumbles off ladders, cuts from hand and power tools, and fractures from falls on tool-littered stairways.

Excessive exposure to the sun through work or leisure activities can result in heat exhaustion, sunburn or even sunstroke. Regard the sun and summer heat as hostile. Don't expose yourself to either for prolonged periods of time.

Take a long look at home safety this summer. Don't let your safety awareness slip into semiconsciousness.
