MANAGEMENT NEWS---ON THE NATIONAL LEVEL

A JUDGE in Lawrence County has an unusual Christmas custom, but one that makes sense. R. G. BARRY CORP., a Columbus, Ohio, firm that makes women's house slippers, pillows, bath robes, and leisure wear, has used Human Resources accounting since 1968. HRA is a management information system that puts a monetary value on the training, development, and approximate replacement costs of employees doing various types of work. They consider management development an investment, not an expense; furnish managers the "book value" of the people in their departments every three months. They say ballpark figures for replacement cost or investment is \$1,000 for a clerical worker, \$4,000 for first-line supervisors, \$10,000 for engineers and other professionals, \$16,000 to \$18,000 for middle managers, \$35,000 and up for top-level managers. The Barry Corp., Texas Instruments, American Airlines, General Telephone & Electronics Laboratories, Inc., and about 50 other companies are interested in HRA: the American Accounting Assn. has a committee working on it.

THE WORLD'S LARGEST cooling tower--500 ft. high and 400 ft. in base diam. -- is in Charleston, W. Va. Heated water from a 1300-megawatt power plant is cooled within the tower as it flows down both sides of asbestos-cement sheets. The tower took 21,000 cubic yards of poured cement.

FACED WITH a 131% increase in mailing costs over the next four years, magazine publishers are looking for a cheaper way of delivery to subscribers. One company in the east is trying milk-man-delivery for a dozen magazines.

WEBB'S CITY in downtown St. Petersburg, Fla., is called the "World's most unusual drug store." There are six buildings, two of them seven stories high, which house 77 "stores." Included are a subterranean cafeteria which seats over 500, the world's largest fountain grill which serves 12,000 daily, the largest florist shop on Florida's west coast, the South's largest volume gasoline station, the South's largest selection of fishing tackle and equipment, a barber shop with 40 barbers, a beauty and wig salon, a dry cleaning plant, a seven-story furniture store, a greeting card section that sells a million cards a year, the South's largest selection of cameras, projectors and photographic supplies. a large self-serve food supper market, family shoe store and shoe repair, electric shaver sales and service, hearing aid sales and service, optical sales and eye glass prescription service, surgical and hospital supplies and trusses, the world's largest retail candy store, a 1,000 gallon-a-day ice cream plant, 12 free parking lots for 2,000 cars, a check cashing service, and the world's largest drug and prescription business. Webb's City has 1,500 employees.
