A PETITION was filed seeking Union representation for weekly salaried employees at the Oak Ridge Gaseous Diffusion Plant operated by Union Carbide. The action was taken by the Professional Employees Division of the Oil, Chemical & Atomic Workers International Union. In a secret ballot election held May 14 and 15 the employees decided to reject unionization, 63% to 37%.

NINE FACULTY MEMBERS of the University of Virginia Nuclear Engineering Department have written Governor Mills E. Godwin, Jr. expressing concern over the "inflammatory accusations" being made about nuclear power and endorsing nuclear energy as representing risks that are "in fact, lower than those associated with the alternative energy sources commonly used for the generation of electricity." Following are excerpts from their letter:

There is "a campaign currently under way before legislative and judicial institutions of the nation, at all levels, to curtail the use of nuclear fission energy to produce electric power. The attack derives its main force from inflammatory accusations which often distort the facts and which, once quoted, find ready acceptance in the public press. Arguments offered in rebuttal usually are technically complex, lacking the sensationalism of the original charges, and are seldom afforded the same media coverage.

"Much is being said about 'new,' and allegedly environmentally pure, energy sources: solar, geothermal, the tides, and others. It is significant that none of these sources really is new; they have been around for many years. However, as yet there has been no demonstration that any of these sources is capable of providing electric power in the amounts needed or at a cost comparable to today's generating cost."


A. P. ROMERO spoke to 25 first graders on Mexico's customs, language and dancing at Allen School in Chillicothe on April 30th.
