GOODYEAR announced record third quarter sales of \$1.9 billion with profit of \$45.5 million, a 35.5 percent increase over the third quarter of 1977, according to Charles J. Pilliod, Jr., Chairman of the Board. The profit performance, according to Pilliod, was the second best for any third quarter in company history, and was achieved after a \$6.4 million provision to cover the expense of closing two non-competitive operations, the North Chicago hose plant and Plant 5 synthetic latex facility. Earnings for the quarter were 63 cents a share, compared with the 46 cents per share of a year ago when profits were \$33.5 million.

THE PRICE of uranium enrichment services will increase approximately 18.4 percent effective the first of the year. The present price is \$74.85 for each separative work unit (SWU) for customers who have entered into long-term contracts. Starting January 1, the price will rise \$13.80 to \$88.65 per SWU. According to the Department of Energy, revenues from the three gaseous diffusion plants amounted to \$900 million during fiscal 1978. During the current fiscal year, revenues are expected to exceed \$1 billion.

RECENT FEDERAL HIRING from eligibility lists has been well below normal--157,000 persons in 1977 compared to an average of 192,000 yearly for the past 10 years. About 167,000 new hires are expected by the end of 1978. Increased hiring is expected due to turnover, more employees eligible for retirement, and the impact of reorganization.

MOWANKIND?? Professor Robert Longwell of the University of Northern Colorado has proposed new words to overcome sexist language. The professor suggests "hesh" (with a long e) for "he or she." DILATORY TACTICS used by intervenors raised the price of the Seabrook nuclear plant in New Hampshire a staggering \$419 million according to a new study by the Heritage Foundation. The study concludes that needless delays attributable to intervenor activity will be reflected in a 9.8% higher electric bill for the average residential customer. This amounts to \$1,316.83 more for an average customer over the life of the plant. In addition, the study says that the delays have cost workers nearly \$133 million in total wages. The study further charges that intervenors raised the same issues again and again in numerous proceedings, varying their allegations just enough to force the drafting of new responses, lengthening the licensing process even further.

A WEST COAST COMPANY believes it has finally found a way to get everyone to arrive at meetings on time. They set their meetings at offbeat times: 10:04, for example, or 3:42 -- never at the usual times, 10:00 or 3:45. The company has found that a man who may be fifteen minutes late for a 10:00 meeting will tend to be on time if the meeting is set at 10:04 or 9:56.
