The "Kick-Off" meeting for the 1982 Goodyear Atomic "All-In-One" Campaign for United Way will be Friday, Oct. 15. The campaign begins on Monday, Oct. 18, and continues through Friday, Oct. 29. The goal for this year's drive will be \$77,100. The salary employee goal is \$65,000. Mike Gill, OCAW chairman, has set that Union's goal at \$10,500. Dave Davis, UPGWA chairman, has set the D-122 hourly police officer goal at \$1,600. Three employees have been selected to serve as Miss All-In-One and include Beckee Tudor, salary; Pam Harrington, OCAW; and Lisa Weathersbee, UPGWA. Each employee contributing at least \$12 to United Way through the AIO campaign will have a chance to win one of ten \$100 savings bonds which will be awarded through drawings on Nov. 5. Employees will be able to complete an additional drawing ticket for each additional \$12 increment in the pledge amount, thus providing a better chance at winning a bond. However, an individual employee can win only one bond. Participation is voluntary; those who do not wish to compete can still pledge a contribution but simply will not complete any tickets for the drawing.

Goodyear Atomic firemen will present Home Fire Safety programs on Monday, Oct. 4, from 10:00 a.m. until noon in the GAT cafeteria. That day is the beginning of National Fire Prevention Week. The program will be similar to that which has been presented by GAT firemen Mark Lewis, John Cannon, Dave Marhoover and Doug Bentley for area pre-school and elementary school children. The session will feature discussions on home fire safety, smoke detectors and exit route planning and procedures.
