#### Nuclear Notes

The much improved U. S. economy has buoyed hopes that a rising tide will lift all boats, including the nuclear industry, noted the Atomic Industrial Forum (AIF) recently. The AIF noted that the business recovery of 1983 nudged U. S. electrical demand upward (about 3.6 percent). U. S. nuclear plants did even better, the AIF said. Nuclear generation topped the 300-billion kilowatt-hour mark for the first time, and reached an estimated 310 billion KWH. Carl Walske, AIF president, noted this represented "a thumping 9.5 percent growth rate" for nuclear electricity in 1983. Walske said the improved economy should be viewed more as a warning than a promise. "If load growth continues to the point where utility executives have to make decisions to buy more generating capacity, the nuclear industry better be ready to deliver," he said. Walske said 1983 was full of ambiguities for the nuclear industry. For example, President Reagan's signature on the Nuclear Waste Policy Act on January 7 was a highlight, yet the Department of Energy already has missed important mileposts and at year-end was running an estimated three years behind its 1987 target date for selecting a high-level waste repository site, he said.

## News from Goodyear

Goodyear has announced that it has agreed to sell its plant and property in Jackson, Michigan, to Universal Process Equipment, Inc., of Robbinsville, New Jersey. The sale price was not disclosed. The company closed the plant Jan. 11 after 47 years of operation. The plant includes nearly one million square feet under roof and about 59 acres of land. Terms of the sale agreement call for the sale to be effective on or before March 30.

Robert E. Milk will become vice president for Materials Management of The Goodyear Tire & Rubber Company on March 1, and Earl W. Dahl will succeed him as vice president for product quality and safety, according to Chairman Robert E. Mercer. Milk succeeds V. L. "Larry" Petersen, who is retiring after 37 years of service, the last 16 as vice president. Dahl, formerly director of Tire Programs, was elected to his new position Feb. 14 by the board of directors.

To accommodate the increasingly global nature of markets, Goodyear's General Products areas are being consolidated on a worldwide basis. "The consolidation will enable us to bring the full force of our product range, product quality and value into play in all geographical markets we serve around the world," said Robert E. Mercer, chairman and chief executive officer of the corporation. "In addition, it offers a framework for increased productivity and profitability." Under the new organization, Westi Hansen, corporate executive vice president in charge of General Products since 1981, also becomes President—General Products Worldwide. Three executives will have worldwide responsibilities for sales and marketing of their products. They are Donald E. Harrington, vice president of Industrial Products for Goodyear International, J. David Wolf, general manager, Chemical Products, and Anthony F. Thomas, general manager, Film Products. Each will report for his worldwide responsibilities to Hansen, and to either Douglas F. Hill, executive vice president of Goodyear International, or Cliff Johnson, president of Goodyear Canada, as appropriate, for field responsibilities.
