The "All-In-One" expression which labels the Goodyear Atomic campaign for United Way has a very significant meaning. It not only says that an employee can effectively and efficiently pledge to several agencies in one gift, but also reflects on the hard work of all employee groups at the plant. Salaried employees, OCAW Local 3-689 and UPGWA Local 66 ALL are dedicating many hours of work to INsure the success of this ONE effort.

Salary chairman again this year is Jim Yocum, manager, Information Management. The OCAW Local 3-689 trichairman is Gary Pinkerman and John Kerrison is leading the UPGWA Local 66 campaign.

Ten \$100 savings bonds again will be awarded by a drawing to employees who contribute at least \$12 to the campaign.

Each of us should carefully consider a meaningful gift to United Way. Our contributions are investments in our own home towns. We look forward to having each employee help us carry out another successful and meaningful campaign.

THE "UNITED WAY"

The more than 2,000 civic funding campaigns in the United States go by many names -- United Way, United Fund, Community Chest. But they have one primary goal -- helping a wide range of special agencies to provide essential services within their particular communities.

These campaigns call on community residents only once each year for assistance in funding agencies that work right in their own neighborhoods. Industry, business people, professionals and others have a role in ensuring that these agencies can continue to provide health and welfare, recreational and other needed functions.

Goodyear Atomic and its employees have donated more than \$1.27 million to United Way since 1953. Local United Way organizations have come to depend on Goodyear Atomic employees for a high level of assistance during their annual campaigns.

The Goodyear Atomic "All—In—One" Campaign begins Monday, Oct. 15, and continues through Friday, Oct. 26. Our goal for employee contributions this year is \$95,840.

MAKING A PLEDGE

Solicitors will have available for each employee a personalized IBM card. Employees will use this card to make payroll deduction authorization or record payment in cash or check. Employees must sign their card to authorize payroll deduction.

Payroll deductions begin on Jan. 1, 1985, and continue through Dec. 31, 1985. There are 24 pay periods for salary employees and 52 pay periods for hourly employees during the year. A contributor should multiply the deduction amount elected by the number of pay periods to calculate a total for the year. Also, an employee can divide a pre-selected total by the number of pay periods in the year. The total donation should be indicated on the appropriate line.

Every card must have a designated county. This can be one of the four primary counties near the plant (boxes 1-4), or another county which would be noted beside box number 5. Most counties have a United Way organization, and GAT employee contributions are distributed to them as an administrative service by United Way of Scioto County. However, there are some counties that do not have United Way (including Adams, Highland, Vinton and Gallia counties in Ohio), but their citizens usually can benefit from the services provided by United Way agencies in an adjacent county.

Checks should be made payable to the county United Way (e.g. United Way of Scioto County, etc.), not Goodyear Atomic. All employee cards are to be returned, even for those who do not wish to make a contribution. This enables the AIO staff to keep track of all cards and to make sure that all employees have had the opportunity to make a pledge.

All contributors will receive a receipt card signed by the solicitor. Your contribution is tax deductible.

PRIZE DRAWING

For the 1984 All—In—One Campaign for 1985 United Way agency funding, Goodyear has again made available ten \$100 U. S. Savings Bonds. These will be awarded to employees through drawings conducted on Friday, Nov. 9.

A contributor will have one chance for each \$12 contribution (two chances for a contribution of \$24 or more, three for a contribution of \$36 or more, etc.). Solicitors will be responsible for determining the number of chances for which a contributor is eligible and submitting completed tickets to the AIO office.

An individual employee will be able to win only one savings bond. Participation in the drawing is voluntary. An employee can still make a cash, check or pledge gift to the United Way and not participate in the bond drawing.
